CITY COUNCIL MEETS.

Next Pay Cash for Coal.—The Ogden River Flats.—Street Paving.—Collector's Bond.

The city council met last evening in regular session. All members were present excepting Councilman Paris. Councilman Hill of the five committee reported that a bid of \$25 had been received from Mr. Brown for repaving the turnpike of the central fire station and street that he be employed.

Mr. Hill also reported that city warrants were no longer good with the coal dealers and that each must accompany orders for the same. He favored making arrangements for the winter supply at an early date. On motion of Councilman Hill, the committee on public buildings and grounds was instructed to investigate the cost of coal in various lots.

The paving committee, in whom had been referred the Japan resolution in reference to paving the street at Twenty-fifth street, and charging the same up to the street car company, recommended the adoption of the same. The report and resolution were adopted.

Lowrey of Salt Lake to be forwarded to England, and duplicates would cost \$25.
