#### Andrew Jenson Returns from His Fifth Mission to Scandinavia.

Elder Andrew Jenson, assistant Church historian, returned from a special mission to Scandinavia Tuesday night, after an absence of eight months. Elder Jenson left this city in August, Elder Jenson left this city in August. 1964, and after spending a short time at the world's fair, he proceeded to his destination, where he directed the pub-lication of a history of the Prophet Jo-seph Smith in the Danish-Norwegian language. The work was printed by a firm that has done Church printing for over 50 years, and is a handsome vol-ums of 400 pages. It was warmiy wel-comed by the missionaries and Saints. and will do much, it is thought, to counteract the efforts of anti-'Mor-mon' ministers, who have been attack-ing the Church for some time past, both in Denmark and Norway. The book will also be published in the Swedish lan-suage, so that its influence may like-wise be feit in that section.

Here he was prevalled upon to meet a Luth-eran priest, who was touring the coun-try declaiming against the "Mormons" and their religion. This gentleman had been in the United States and had speni also a period of three days in Utah. during which time he day "studied" een in the United States and had spent also a period of three days in Utah. during which time he had "studied" "Mormonism." The discussion was quite lively and created something of a stir in that section. The newspapers were very fair in their treatment of the debate and many false impressions con-cerning the "Mormons" were shattered. Returning, Elder Jenson landed in Boston March 8, since which time he has toured the eastern, northern and central states missions. to Scandinavia in 30 years, and he re-turns in good health and spirits, well pleased with the experience. He says President Fjéldsted is coming home and will be succeeded by Elder J. M. Chrisensen of this city, while Elder Peter Madsen will preside over the work in Sweden.

The proposed changes in the sewer plan made by City Engineer Riter, whereby the residents along Ninth South street from Eighth West to Third East will be provided with a sewer main, was discussed briefly by the members of the sewerage committhe members of the sewerage commit-tee last night, but no definite action was taken in the matter. The change in the plan means the ex-penditure of \$5,500 more than the amount of the bond money provided for that purpose and the city engineer suggested that this additional sum he raised by levying a special tax on the

raised by levying a special tax on the abutting property. This, however, is opposed by a number of property ownrs on the street, as they do not think t a fair deal to make them pay a speial assessment, while all the other
