

SOME OBJECTIONS TO THE FRANCHISE

Representatives of the Light Company and City Council Complete Their Work.

DEBATE ON THE RESTRICTIONS

Changes in Proposed Ordinance to be Made Before It is Acceptable to Both Sides.

The members of the municipal laws and special water committees of the city council and other representatives of the city and the representatives of the Utah Light and Railway company yesterday afternoon completed the work of reading the proposed franchise for the consolidation and extension of the present franchise of the company for 50 years from Jan. 1, 1905. City Atty. Dey, Asst. City Atty. Bramel and Judge Le Grand Young will make the changes in the franchise agreed upon and will submit it for approval at a meeting of the committee on Monday afternoon.

A number of objections were made by Judge Young to the sections of the franchise read yesterday afternoon. He objected to the forfeiture clause which provides a penalty of from \$100 to \$1000 for every violation of any of the provisions of the franchise, as he said it would keep the company paying fines all the time for every trivial matter. An objection was also raised to the company being required to furnish an indemnifying bond of \$25,000 to secure the city against loss by reason of any violations of the ordinance by the company. Judge Young secured Asst. City Atty. Bramel with attempting to draw a franchise which would not be acceptable to the company. If the city insisted on some of the sections remaining in the ordinance he intimated that it would not be accepted by the company.

Councilman A. J. Davis, it is said, will propose an additional section to the franchise providing that at the expiration of the 50 years all of the property of the company will revert to the city.

TO ENJOIN BONDS.

Real Estate Associations Adopt Some Resolutions Looking to That End.

At yesterday afternoon's monthly meeting of the Real Estate association, action was taken looking towards the enjoining of the sale of the \$1,000,000 worth of bonds voted for at last January's special city election, as it is now alleged that false representations were made to the voters. J. H. Houston was chosen chairman of a special committee for conference with legal attorneys with a view to early and active legal proceedings. Mr. Houston to choose two associates on his committee. The following resolutions were finally adopted:

Whereas, On the 3rd day of January, A. D. 1905, the citizens and taxpayers of Salt Lake City voted to and did authorize the city council of Salt Lake City to issue bonds to the amount of \$1,000,000 for the betterment of the water supply and sewerage of Salt Lake City; and

Whereas, The published representations of the committee of the city council and mayor associated, and upon which the citizens voted, are much in variance with the statements given at this time; and

Whereas, The citizens apparently have been misled in this matter, and if present plans were to be submitted to a vote of the people it would undoubtedly be defeated; and

Whereas, There will be a large loss to the city in carrying out the proposed water plan; therefore be it resolved, That the Salt Lake City Real Estate association does hereby condemn the present plan as proposed by the council, and take steps in securing a restraining order on the issuance of the water and sewerage bonds, that the people may be informed as to what negotiations have been made and in order that the courts may pass upon the legality of the issue.

HOME FROM EUROPE.

Andrew Jensen Returns from His Fifth Mission to Scandinavia.

Elder Andrew Jensen, assistant Church historian, returned from a special mission to Scandinavia Tuesday night, after an absence of eight months. Elder Jensen left this city in August, 1904, and after spending a short time at the world's fair, he proceeded to his destination, where he directed the publication of a history of the Prophet Joseph Smith in the Danish-Norwegian language. This work was printed by a firm that has done Church printing for over 50 years, and is a handsome volume of 400 pages. It was warmly welcomed by the missionaries and Saints, and will do much, it is thought, to counteract the efforts of anti-Mormon ministers, who have been attacking the Church for some time past, both in Denmark and Norway. The book will also be published in the Swedish language, so that its influence may likewise be felt in that section.

Elder Jensen then proceeded to Germany, visiting on route Nilsen, Horan and Aarhus in Jutland, Denmark. Here he was prevailed upon to meet a Lutheran minister, who was touring the country declining against the "Mormons" and their religion. This gentleman had been in the United States and had spent some time in Utah, where he had "studied" "Mormonism." His discussion was very lively and created something of a debate and many false impressions concerning the "Mormons" were shattered. The priest was assisted by about a dozen of his clerical brethren, but despite

CHANGES IN SEWER.

Proposed Alterations on Ninth South Is Productive of Protest.

The proposed changes in the sewer plan made by City Engineer Riter, whereby the residents along Ninth South street from Eighth West to Third East will be provided with a sewer main, was discussed briefly by the members of the sewerage committee last night, but no definite action was taken in the matter.

The change in the plan means the expenditure of \$5,000 more than the amount of the bond money provided for that purpose and the city engineer suggested that this additional sum be raised by levying a special tax on the abutting property. This, however, is opposed by a number of property owners on the street, as they do not think it a fair deal to make them pay a special assessment, while all the other sewer improvements proposed will be paid for out of the bond money.

MEDDLESOME GRUNDYS SHOULD CONSIDER THIS

To the Editor:

As some of the meddlesome Grundys seem to have a great deal to say about the "Mormon" Church, it seems strange that they have not sense enough to understand that the "Mormon" Church takes this method of collecting its church funds, the same as all other churches have their different systems of raising money for church expenses. We do not hear of their going away for a great number of years, feathering their nests in some foreign country, living on the fat of the land, say for 20 years or more, and if they happily fall into the hands of the brigands, make it cost this government thousands of dollars for their release (with a cherished desire to again return to the brigands). Better to have stayed there, and saved the government this vast sum of money. Then, too, the Protestant churches have a system of poking the contribution plate under one's nose at every service, no matter if it be three or four times on one Sabbath. Then they have a habit of demanding contributions of estates, and tell you they (the church) are going to give an entertainment, and that it will only cost you 10 or 25 cents, as the case may be, to attend, at the same time holding out all kinds of inducements as to the lovely refreshments they are going to serve. If it happens to be a church fair also, you are expected to buy liberally of the things (all of which have been donated) offered. These, then, are some of the methods by which the Protestant churches collect their church funds; and I will venture to assert (and without truthful contradiction) that there is not another denomination on earth that can collect the amount of money from off their church members, that the Catholic church collects, and some of their methods are certainly far below par, in comparison to the "Mormon" tithing. The "Mormons" men take the responsibility and labor upon themselves to do the work of collecting, while the priests send the sisters to do their collecting. How often do we see the sisters in the new mining camps, even before there is scarcely a building of any kind finished, not only asking contributions, but demanding a day's pay from every man working. Soon that mining camp will be fully equipped with a Catholic church, Catholic school and a hospital, as the three seem to go together, and thousands and hundreds of thousands of dollars are thus collected for the Catholic church funds.
