

18 Henry Philpot, Bishop of Exeter, died, aged 91.

20 Grand demonstration in London, in favor of the Fenians.

Letter of Father Hyacinthe published in the French papers announcing that he abandons his convent and ceases thenceforth to preach.

25 Discouraging news from the revolutionists in Cuba.

28 The British bark, *Strathspey*, foundered at sea while on a voyage to Queens-town. After being at sea for seven days and nights, in boats, the crew were picked up by the *Surcouf* and taken to San Francisco.

26 Fight at Barcelona between volunteers and regular troops.

28 Earthquake at Callao.

29 Terrible fire at Bordeaux, France, caused by the burning of a large quantity of petroleum, thirty vessels destroyed.

Trouble in Barcelona—26 persons arrested for complicity in the revolutionary movement.

1 County fair opened at Provo.

Shock of earthquake felt at Fillmore.

3 Vice President Colfax and party arrived at Salt Lake City.

4 Fair of the Deseret Manufacturing and Agricultural Society opened in the 13th Ward Assembly Rooms.

5 First semi-annual meeting of the shareholders of Zion's Co-operative Mercantile Institution.

6 The Thirty-Ninth Semi-Annual Conference of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints convened in the New Tabernacle.

7 Mass meeting held in the New Tabernacle to petition Congress for admission into the Union as a State.

Mormon Battalion party held at the Social Hall.

8 Elder Albert Carrington appointed to fill the vacancy in the Quorum of the Twelve made vacant by the death of Elder Ezra Taft Benson.

9 The meeting of Zion's Camp held a reunion party at the Social Hall.

10 Conference closed. About 150 Elders called to go on missions to the States during its session.

16 A company of Saints in charge of Elder J. Lawson, reached Ogden.

20 Three days muster and encampment of the troops of Salt Lake military district commenced at Camp Wasatch.

26 Accident near Evanston to a train bringing a company of Latter-day Saints, in which three of the Saints were killed and four wounded.

27 A collision between a freight train and a construction train, two miles east of Promontory. Several were badly hurt.

Presidents Young and Smith and several Elders started for Sanpete.

28 A company of Saints arrived at Ogden from Liverpool.

Indian relics found at the place where the terminus of the U. C. is to be located.

Elder John Taylor, Bishop Sharp, Elder W. C. Staines and Elder Geo. Teasdale arrived from the East.

Erection of boards naming the streets of the city.

29 Lord Berkely Paget and Lord Waterpark, English noblemen, in this city.

Henry Case, one of the men injured by the collision; who lived in the 8th Ward, died at Promontory.

30 A fire occurred in the 10th Ward.

31 Some Indians made a raid on Kanarra, Iron County, and ran off a number of horses and mules.

1 Boiler burst at Agricultural fair, Indianapolis; twenty-three killed and from fifty to sixty wounded.

5 Terrible rain storm along the Atlantic sea board; much damage done.

6 Floods in the Eastern States, much damage done and many lives lost.

9 Ex-President Pierce died at Concord, New Hampshire.

12 Another dreadful storm in Philadelphia.

18 Father Hyacinthe reached New York.

22 First through train of Pullman's palace cars arrived at San Francisco.

Earthquake felt in New England, New Brunswick and elsewhere.

23 Severe snow storm at St. Louis.

25 Companies of negroes being organized to suppress the Ku Klux at Raleigh, North Carolina.

Gold ring investigations in New York.

26 Carbolic acid tank exploded at a wood preserving factory in New York. Several persons were killed.

Butterfield, Assistant Treasurer at New York, resigned office.

27 Strike of Telegraph operators for higher wages at New York.

The Erie strike settled.

The case of the officers of the *Cuba* was resumed at Wilmington, N. C.

A band of counterfeiters arrested at Cincinnati.

Paymaster Bogart, charged by a naval court martial with swindling the Government of some \$20,000, was released.

Discovery of counterfeit tobacco stamps.

Extensive seizure of illicit stills at Brooklyn.

28 Great fire at the village of Charlotte near Rochester; loss \$40,000.

Steamer *Stonewall* burned on the Mississippi river.

Nauveo talked of as a site for the national Capital.

Two ferry boats collided on the East river, New York.

29 A fire occurred in Liberty St. New York, several persons were smothered by the smoke.

Mr. John B. Norman, editor of the *New Albany Daily Ledger*, the oldest daily in Indiana, died.

31 A woman's convention was held at New York.

Fire at Richmond, Va., loss \$165,000.

The deputy sheriff of Evansville, Indiana, James Fitzwilliam, was shot dead in a saloon by a policeman.

Hog cholera raging in Cincinnati.

FOREIGN.

7 Formidable riot among the miners of Auvergnon.

9 A silver mine at Guanato, Mexico, fell in, crushing one hundred men, women and children.

11 Considerable alarm prevailing on the Canadian frontier on account of the Fenian invasion.

The Republican cause in Spain is causing much trouble.

One thousand and nine hundred insurgents surrendered to General Buldick.

Several fights occurred in different parts of Spain between republican and regular troops.

12 Fighting at Saragossa.

The volunteers throughout Canada received orders to hold themselves in readiness for immediate service.

14 Valencia besieged by the regular troops.

15 More fighting in Catalonia and Grenada, 20,000 insurgents in the field petitions to be allowed to capitulate refused.

16 Valencia, after a battle of several hours, surrendered to the Government forces.

23 Lord Derby died, aged 70.

26 Disastrous inundation in Yucatan—the town Multinipoe completely destroyed.

27 A severe earthquake was felt at Manilla.

Jean de Francisco, Minister Plenipotentiary from Honduras, died in London, England.

The Marquis of Westminster died at London, aged 74.

NOVEMBER.

AMERICAN.

Utah.

1 During the night some Indians made a raid on Kanarra, stealing some thirty-four head of animals.

The *Millennial Star* stated that during the present season rather more than two thousand Saints emigrated to Utah.

2 George Robbins, a boy ten years of age, of the 8th Ward, was accidentally killed, near Elder W. Woodruff's farm.

8 Elder John Woodman, aged 95, died at Willard City.

Carpenters began work on the gallery in the New Tabernacle.

10 Elder George Smith died in this city. He was in his 68th year.

12 Elder Thomas Bourne died in this city, in his 74th year.

13 Utah Central Railroad completed to Kayville.

18 Miss Annie Lockhart died in Salt Lake City.

21 The first excursion train passed over the Utah Central Railroad.

22 Ogden decided upon as the junction of the Union and Central Pacific Railroads.

22 Mrs. Augusta N. St. Clair lectured in the Theatre, Salt Lake City.

26 Mrs. Nersen, of Corn Creek, died at Bountiful, where she had been accidentally shot a few days previously.

GENERAL.

1 General Belknap installed in office at Washington as Secretary of War.

Information received by the Commissioner of Indian affairs of the death of Pe-up, a notorious Indian chief, and leader of the Indian forces against General Custer.

The Board of Education of Cincinnati passed resolutions excluding the Bible from being read in public schools.

2 Cisco, California, destroyed by fire.

Terrible gale in New York.

6 Remarkable Jewish convention at Philadelphia.

8 The Varieties Theatre, Helena, Montana, burned.

12 A war inaugurated between the Erie and Atlantic and Great Western Railway Companies, causing great excitement.

Honorable Amos Kendall died at Washington.

14 Horrible accident on the Western Pacific Railroad, near San Leandro, California. Great loss of life.

17 Terrible gale throughout the Eastern States. Many persons killed, much property destroyed. The storm extended nearly all over the States, from Denver to Maine and from the Lakes to the Gulf of Mexico.

22 A severe gale passed over Colorado, doing immense damage.

24 The Spanish gun-boats that had been Building at New York, were seized and

placed in the custody of the United States authorities.

25 A. D. Richardson, of the New York *Tribune*, shot in the *Tribune* office by McFarland, who accused Richardson of improper intimacy with his wife.

FOREIGN.

2 Information received of the good health and success of Dr. Livingston, the African explorer.

From the 26th of October to date, two hundred shocks of earthquake had been felt in Germany.

4 George Peabody died in London.

5 Céspedes stated that during the last four months 12,000 men had enlisted in the Cuban army.

9 The official Italian papers represent King Victor Emanuel, recently sick, as now out of danger.

12 Obsequies of the late George Peabody took place at Westminster Abbey, London.

Deputies Carlo and Luno, of the Cortes, tried and convicted of treason and condemned to death, at Madrid.

16 Opening of the Suez Canal. The Emperor of Austria, Empress of France, the Viceroy of Egypt and many other notables assisted at the ceremony.

17 The imperial yacht *Aigle*, with the Empress of the French, followed by forty other vessels anchored at Ismalia, having passed through the first part of the Suez Canal.

20 Fearful gale on the British Coast. Many shipwrecks.

News reached the Canadian authorities about this time of an out-break among the half-breeds of the Red River settlement.

21 The Spanish Crown offered to the Duke of Genoa, son of Victor Emanuel.

23 General Dulce died at Madrid.

27 Great Fenian demonstrations held in various parts of Ireland. At Tipperary and other places riots occurred.

30 Senate and Corps Legislatif, of France, were opened with great ceremony by the Emperor.

During this month the Czar of Russia issued a ukase extirpating two thousand Jews and their families.

Shocks of earthquake were felt at the cities of Frankfort, Weisbaden and Mayence, Germany.

Utah.

6 Utah Central Railroad permanently opened for traffic from Ogden to Farmington.

13 One hundred head of horses driven from Parowan, Iron county, by Indians.

15 The winter course of lectures at the Seventies' Hall opened with a lecture from H. W. Naisbett.

18 Telegraphic office opened at Franklin, Cache county.

21 Wm R. Bollen died in the 18th Ward, aged 61.

22 Fair of the Female Relief Society of the 14th Ward opened.

22 Guss Sprouse sentenced to be shot at Ogden, for the killing of Martin at Uintah, on the 15th October.

22 Tracklaying resumed on the Utah Central Railroad.

31 Typographical ball held at the Social Hall.

GENERAL.

2 A. D. Richardson died.

Heavy fire at Cleveland, Ohio.

Immense frauds discovered in the Customs Department, New York.

5 Congress of the United States assembled.

6 The President of the United States delivered his Message.

The female suffrage bill passed both houses of the Wyoming Legislature.

16 A plot discovered to destroy the Spanish gunboats which had been lately released and were preparing to sail from New York.

President Grant nominated Col. Wilson Shaffer, of Illinois, Governor of Utah.

18 A terrible coal-pit accident occurred at Stockton, Penn.; a large amount of property destroyed and ten lives lost.

19 Eighteen of the Spanish gun-boats sailed from New York.

20 Shock of earthquake felt at Memphis.

President Grant nominated ex-Secretary Stanton as a Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States.

21 Senator Cragin, in the Senate, reported favorably, with amendments, the bill to provide for the execution of the law against polygamy in Utah.

Shock of an earthquake felt at Downville and elsewhere in California.

24 New postal convention between the United States and Great Britain announced to take effect on January 1st, 1870.

Ex-Secretary of War and Justice, E. M. Stanton, died.

Flags were displayed at half mast on most of the public buildings in New York, Boston and elsewhere, as a mark of respect to Stanton.

Several hundred feet of the Niagara Falls branch of the Central railroad washed away and other damage done by a heavy storm.

Snyders' opera house was burned at Lafayette; loss \$40,000.

A tug boat blew up near the Atlantic wharf, New York.

A Cotton packery was burned at New Orleans; loss \$30,000.

25 A most destructive fire occurred at Syracuse, laying waste \$450,000 worth of property.

26 Frederick S. Cozens, the well known author, was buried.

27 The Columbian Sugar refinery, at Philadelphia, was burned. Damages \$220,000; insurance \$120,000.

The Denver stage was stopped and robbed fifteen miles from Cheyenne. Sixty cavalrymen went in pursuit.

28 A bundle containing \$6,000 worth of bonds, stolen fifteen years ago, was left at one of the police stations at New York, by a boy, who escaped.

Twenty-six distinct shocks of earthquake had been felt at Maropisa, Nevada.

The completion of the Oregon Central railroad was celebrated at San Francisco.

29 The savings bank at Rockville Conn., was robbed of six thousand dollars in bonds, and one hundred and fifty dollars in bills.

FOREIGN.

4 In the Cortes, General Prim stated that since the commencement of the Cuban rebellion fourteen vessels of war had sailed for Cuba, transporting nearly 40,000 troops.

6 A large Fenian amnesty meeting held at Dundee, Scotland.

8 The Ecumenical Council commenced its sittings at Rome.

9 Pere Hyacinthe delivered a lecture in New York, previous to his return to Europe.

A congress of Anti-Papal representatives assembled at Naples. The meeting was a failure.

10 The Pope delivered two allocutions at the Ecumenical Council.

11 The remains of the late Geo. Peabody received on board H. B. M. ironclad *Monarch* for conveyance to the United States.

Revolutionary placards posted all over Lisbon.

13 News received of the ratification of the treaty between the United States and China.

Great political agitation in Portugal. Disorders took place at Oporto. The Pope issues an important Bull regulating the Ecumenical Council.

14 The Carlists still active on the French and Portugese frontiers.

Several sharp engagements took place in Cuba.

15 The Italian Royal Family strongly object to the Duke of Genoa becoming King of Spain.

28 The trial of Traupman, for the murder of the Kinck family commenced in France.

A heavy shock of earthquake, which lasted one minute, reported to have taken place forty miles below Quebec, Canada.

A dispatch from Luzerne, Switzerland, reported the death of Victor Ruffy, President elect of Switzerland.

News received from Canada of the declaration of independence in the Red River country.

30 Traupman, the murderer of the Kinck family was sentenced to death.
