Logan, March 12 .- An important meet. ing of the county commissioners was held yesterday and the following business was transacted:

AUDIT OF BOOKS.

The committee appointed to audit the books of the Treasurer's office for the four years, 1899 to 1902 inclusive, made the following report, showing an actual shortage of \$1,312.72.

Logan, Utah, March 10, 1904. To the Chairman and Members, Board of County Commissioners, Cache Co., Utah.

Gentlemen :- We submit herewith a report of audit of the receipts and disbursements of the treasurer's office for the four years, 1899 to 1902, inclusive. We find that there was cash on hand on Jan. 1, 1899, as per treasurer's books, the sum of \$13,442.32, distributed to the

various funds. The tax rolls show that the taxes assessed amounted to \$492,390.05. From this amount there was deducted as uncollectible, erroneously assessed, twice assessed, property sold for taxes, etc., and for poor abatements, a total of \$7,186.78, as per statement B, leaving \$485,203.27 ns the actual receipts from taxes for the four years. There was received from the State of Utah the sum of \$69,168.31 during the

four years for school purposes. The receipts of the office for fees, fines, meanses, etc., for redemption of property, including a balance of 1898 taxes, amounted to \$57,835.43.

The total receipts from all sources amounted therefore to the sum of \$625.-449.33 for the years 1899 to 1902, inclu-

sive. We find that the office disbursed dur ing the four years the sum of \$602,357.43 The books show that there was cash on hand Jan. 5, 1903, the sum of \$21,-779.18, as per statement E. This, added to the disbursements, makes a total of \$624,136,61 for which the treasurer has credit. The accounts for the four years there-

fore show as follows: Total receipts from all sources \$625.449 33 Total disbursements 624,136.61

Balance due\$ 1,312.72 We append a statement giving a list of errors in the tax rolls and showing

where they occur. We submit also, as a part of this re-port, the additions of the tax rolls and other accounts made with the adding machine.

We think it proper to call your atten-tion to the fact that in checking the county disbursements we were unable to find any warrants that were paid prior to Sept. 3, 1902, and were told that they had been destroyed. We checked the treasurer's register of warrants paid with the bank book, which showed that the warrants had been paid out of the county funds. We found no receipts for money paid to the different school dis-tricts, other than returned checks showing that the money had been paid, bu these in most cases were not indorsed by the secretary or other officer of the district.
