NEW BICYCLE

ORDINANCE.

One Was Proposed at Last Night's

Council Meeting.

FULL TEXT OF THE MEASURE

Causes Considerable Discussion and

Will Receive Further Consider-

ation on Friday Night.

At the meeting of the City Council

last night the council chamber was filled

by a deputation of wheelmen. It being

understood that an ordinance to sup-

plant the old one passed two weeks

ago, would come up.

A communication was presented from

a committee of wheelmen asking that

a new ordinance be submitted to the

Council, and stating that such an or-

dinance had been drawn up and pre-

sented for the action of the Council em-

bodying the views of the wheelmen and

likewise giving protection by its terms

to the pedestrians. Robertson moved

that the communication and ordinance

be referred to the committee on munici-

pal laws. This proposition was over-

ruled by President Buckle, who said

that no ordinance was before the Coun-

cil and calling Councilman Thomas to

the chair took a seat on the floor of the

house and submitted the ordinance as

amended by himself. The ordinance as

read embodies many of the old provi-

sions but throws open a number of

sidewalks which were closed by the old

ordinance recently passed, and empow-

ers the appointment of the chief of police

of a number of extra policemen to en-

force its provisions.

THE PROPOSED ORDINANCE.

The ordinance in full as proposed by

the wheelmen is as follows, though the

municipal laws committee, which will

consider it Friday afternoon at Coun-

cilman Thomas said in the Dooly

blocks may suggest amendments to it.

"Section 1. It shall be unlawful for

any person to ride a bicycle upon any

sidewalk within the following described

district: On the north side of South

Temple street, from the Oregon Short

Line depot east to Second East street,

on the south side of South Temple street,

from West Temple street east to State

street, on the north side of First South

street, from First West street east to

Second East street, on the south side

of Second East street, from the Rio

Grande Western passenger de-

pot east to Second East street. On the

north side of Second East street, from

First West street east to Second East

street. On both sides of Third South

street, from West Temple street east

to Second East street. On the north

side of Fourth South street, from West

Temple street east to Second East

street. On both sides of West Temple

street, from South Temple street to

Fourth South street. On the east side

of West Temple street, from Fourth

South street to Sixth South street. On

both sides of Second East street, from

South Temple street east to Second

East street. On the south side of

South Temple street, from South

Temple street to Fourth South street

and on the west side of Main street,

from Fourth South street to Sixth

South street. On both sides of State

street, from North Temple street south

to Fourth South street, from South

Temple street to Fourth South street

and on the west side of State street,

from Fourth South street to Sixth

South street. All of Richards street,

resolutions relating to bicycles are here-

by repealed.

"Sec. 14. This ordinance shall go into

effect immediately after its approval."

Mr. Buckle, speaking of the intro-

duction of the new ordinance, said

that the passage of the old ordinance

had been accomplished through a mis-

understanding, and that changes had

been made in it from that one that was

made in the desks of the councilmen.

When the ordinance was passed it was

understood that it satisfied both sides,

but that provisions had crept in it, that

he and other members of the Council

did not know were there, and in jus-

tice to the wheelmen he asked that the

new ordinance be passed at this session.

This was objected to by Robertson

and Whittemore, and the former moved

that it be referred to the committee on

municipal laws, and on roll call, it was

so referred, the understanding being

that the committee report upon it at the

next regular meeting of the council.

TO KEEP OUT FEMALES.

Buckle also introduced an ordinance

amending the ordinance relating to fe-

males entering saloons. It provides

that no female shall be allowed in sa-

loons between the hours of 7 o'clock in

the evenings and 7 o'clock in the morn-

ings. This was also referred to the

committee on municipal laws.

MISCELLANEOUS.

A petition was read asking that Jer-

sey street be graded, which was re-

ferred to committee on streets.

A communication from the board of

public works was read, submitting an

estimate for repaving the street pay-

ing of East Temple street from South

Temple to Fourth South, and on First

and Second South streets between State

and the east boundary of West Temple.

This ordinance is the one submitted to

the board by the city engineer, and is

for \$13,249.41. The matter was referred

to the committee on streets.

The Council adjourned to meet Fri-

day evening, at which meeting the re-

solutions of the city engineer will be re-

ceived concerning the utilizing of the

water from the Liberty Park wells.

The Council will canvass the votes

cast at the special bond election, Fri-

day, from 7:30 to 8:30, when the regular

meeting will open.

ODD FELLOWS HOLD FORTH.

Members of the Order Make a Pleasant

Day at Saltair.

Odd Fellows came from all sections

of the State to join in the excursion to

Saltair yesterday. There were at ap-

proximately 900 visitors from outside towns, the largest

delegation coming from Park City, and

they all manifested their ability to

make fun. About 3 o'clock Grand Mas-

ter A. T. McNamee called the people to-

gether and started the program by

making a brief address. He spoke of

the patriotism and generosity of the

Odd Fellows, and reminded them that

the fellow purpose of the excursion was

to unite more closely in fraternal feel-

ings. He then called for order all over

the State. He said that the order now

had 10,000 lodges in the world, with a

membership of more than one million.

The speaker alluded to the Scotch dis-

aster, in which a number of Odd Fel-

lows were killed, and showed how dan-

gerous the Odd Fellows had been in re-

sponding to the cry for help, there hav-

ing been donated nearly \$18,000 by mem-

bers of the order, for the widows and

orphans of Odd Fellows who were killed
