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

Crop Report. CHICAGO, June 5.-The following rop summary will appear in this week's issue of the Farmers' Review: Continued rains throughout many portions of the west since the last issue have wrought a general improvement in conditions, especially in spring crops, meadows and pastures. Hervest has already commenced in southern winter wheat sections and this crop is nearly past all danger. Our reports on its condition are as follows:
Eighteen counties in Illinois report an average condition of 87 per cent; ten counties report injury from drouth and insects; seventeen counties in Indiana condition of an average condition of seventeen counties in Indiana condition. diana report an average condition of 85 pencent: five counties report injury by insects; fifteen counties in Ohio report au average condition of 76 per cent. and some damage by insects; nine Michigan counties report an average condition of 89 percent with come injury from drouth an average condition of 89 per cent. with some injury from drouth and some from insects; sev-enteen Missouri counties give an average condition of 96 per cent., and

ten counties in Kentucky report an average condition of 87 per cent. Kansas falls away behind, nine counties giving only an average condition of 58 per cent.; Elk County reports "all plowed up;" Lincoln is a total failure, and Phillips is very poor.
