### WATER FUND IS EXHAUSTED.

Fifteen Extra Patrolmen Authorized By Last Night's Session of Council-War Over Appointments.

The water bond fund, a fund raised by the sale of bonds for increasing the city's water supply, has been exhausted, and the payment for the work done under the authority grantwork done under the authority grani-ed with the consent of the people for the bond issue cannot be made from the proper fund. This matter came before the council last night when City Auditor Aalf notified the coun-cil that the tenth partial estimate in favor of P. J. Moran for \$14,500 could not be met from the water bond fund, it having been exhausted. Though this matter might properly go before a grand jury, it was referred by Presi-dent Davis of the council last night to the council committee on finance. That committee will endeavor to un-tangle the fix the city finds before it. This is only one instance of a debt of considerable proportions that must be met from the funds raised by tax-es. The city started in the new year with something like \$145,000 on its credit balance. The "Americans" proudly pointed to this and asked, "Is that a deficit?" In the manner which has become a fixed habit with the Kearns crowd, these same "Ameri-cans" hid the city's obligations when pointing to its bank balance. No one will contend that on the day the bal-ance was struck that there was a de-ficit shown. Reason will say, how-ever, that when the city has met its obligations, there will be a deficit, and a big one. The position the city finds itself in is quite like that of a wage-earner who leaves his work on pay-day with a full pocket and on the way home visits the butcher, the gro-cer, the coal man, the drug store, the bakery, the plumber, the electric light ed with the consent of the people for cer, the coal man, the drug store, the bakery, the plumber, the electric light company, the gas company and the hundred and one other places who welhundred and one other places who wel-come his coming. At each place he has settled a little bill and when he gets home he finds himself longing for another pay-day to come-he is "broke." In the same way the city will find itself "broks" and hard-pressed by its creditors when some of the collectors have called and more are walting. Deficit? Well, not right how, but wait, It's coming.

In a communication from Windsor & Co. of this city, agents for the Fidelity & Deposit company of New York, they advised the council that they would no longer be account, able for any damage under the bond of \$25,000 furnished by them for the Utah Independent Telephone company The reason assigned is that the tele-phone company has not paid its pre-mium on the bond. The situation in brief is that the telephone company is not complying with the requirement of the franchise granted it by furnish-ing a good and sufficient bond. The adjustment of the difficulty is left to the finance committee. The council authorized the renewal of the city's contract with the Utah Light & Railway company for 600 luminous arc lights, to cost the city \$5 each per month.

# GREAT SCHEME REVIVED.

Connection With Rio Grande and Moffat Road Being Rebuilt (on Paper?) A story that has received considerable notice in these news-scarcity times is that a railroad is to be built to connect the Moffat road and the Lio Grande. This project has been commented upon by various railroad men in this city; sometimes in a hopeful in this city; sometimes in a hopeful way; other times in a doubtful voice. Herbert George of Derver is the man to whom is credited the carrying on of the project and he is reported as saying he has Detroit men interested with him. The plan is to build from Dotsero on the Rio Grande to Dilon on the Colorado, & Southern, by way of Kremling on the Moffat road. This would give the Moffat road an en-trance to Leadville and would permit the same line distributing coal throughout the western part of Col-orado.

In this meeting, which was secret, the only data given out was a resolution calling upon whole-salers and manufacturers to discontinue the present practise of sending out goods short in weight and short in measure, and pledging the butchers and grocers to a campaign to secure a law grocers to a campaign to secure a law in the next legislature regulating this

"Resolved, that all grocers through-out the state will be asked to co-operate with us in demanding of the manufac-turers a full weight package or a net weight package on all goods packed for human consumption; that the next legislature will be asked to pass a law requiring the manufacturers to mark the net weight on all packages."
