# MURDER AND SUICICIDE.

Carl Klumb's Relatives Believe Him Victim of Crime.

Des Moines, In., Sept. 24 .- That Carl

Klumb, the supposed suicide, whose body was found near the Golf and Country club, Saturday night, was murdered, is the claim of his wfaithy relatives who started an investigation day. Saturday night, the body, bad-ly decomposed, was found hidden in a brush-heap, with a bullet hole near the heart. Relatives claim that he could not possibly have committed suicide, as no gun was found near the remains and Klumb had no motive for taking own life. He is believed to have had on his person considerable money, which is missing.

The jailers turned the hose on the refractory ne-groes, but this frenzied them. The negroes finally captured the hose and turned it upon the officers and then attacked the latter with bottles, plates, cups and saucers, and with broom handles on the end of which open knives

were fastened. Three of the officers were hemmed in by the negroes and had to draw their pistols in order to get out of range of the bottles. The arrival of the sheriff and police finally quelled the negros. The trouble is said to have resulted from the negroes reading of the Atlanta riots.

"This is the second infernal machine that had been addressed to me," he said. "I cannot understand it at all. What possible reason could any one wish to assassinate me? I have done no hurt to any one that I know of." A previous attempt on Mr. Schiff's life was made on Aug. 18, of last year when a cylinder, packed in inflammable cotton and filled with gunpowder, was sent to his New York office. A clerk who regarded the package as susplclous, soaked it in water before opening it. No clue to the sender of the bomb was ever discovered.
