## FOR A COAST GUARD.

Asst. Secy. of War Oliver Addresses Letter to Scaboard States' Governors.

Washington, March 15 .- Letters have con sent by Asst. Secy. Oliver of the way department to the governors of all seaboard states asking their co-operation in the development of the war department's plan for the training of an effective coast guard through the operation of organized militia in connection wit hthe regulars assigned to coast artillery service.

coast artillery service. The letters were accompanied by cir-culars prepared by the chief of artil-lery, setting forth his scheme to set acide a portion of the state troops in all the coast states for artillery review, the state troops to have each year from seven to 10 days of training at an artil-lery post under the direction of the reg-ulars. The chief of artillery also sug-gests designation of certain state troops to protect the land side of the coast artillery posts, which plan entails no additional expense upon states.

## Southern Pacific Proposes to Spend \$53,810,000 This Year.

San Francisco, March 15.—Thirteen new lines, representing an outlay of \$53,\$10,000 will, it is said, be con-structed this summer by the Southern Pacific, work to begin with settled weather. Five of the new roads, or nearly one-half of the tracks, will be laid in California; 775 miles will ex-tend to Guan leigna, Mexico. This great total of new tracks does not include the electric railway system of 44 miles it is constructing at an outlay of \$2,000,000 in Santa Chara county. Nor does it include the 119 miles of road it is to build jointly with the Santa Fe, under the name of the Northwestern Pacific, north from Willits into Humboldt county in order to give Euroka a rail outlet, at an es-timated expense of \$10,000,000. The 13 new inces will have a total mileage of 1,512. San Francisco, March 15 .--- Thirteen

U. S. SUES GREAT NORTHERN. Helena, Mont., March 15.-In behalf of the federal government, Dist. Atts. Carl Rasch has instituted suit against the Great Northern Bailway company,

the Great Northern Railway company, seeking damages in the sum of 5500, to-pether with costs for an alleged viola-lloo of the act of Congress prohibiting the keeping of livestock in transit for more than 28 hours. The complaint avers that a shipment of horses en route from Washington to Canada by way of Montana was kept aboard cars 48 hours without unload-ing for feed and water, and that as a result several died. This is the first suit of its kind instituted in this state.
