The hull of the vessel will be 60 feet in length and five feet and five inches in depth; twenty-eight feet over all in width; the length of the main rig will be sixty-one feet. A pilot house and other rooms will be added to the upper deck. The steamer will be put on the lake this fall, as soon as finished. The cost of the vessel is estimated at \$125,000.
