Physician Wanted Fee Before Signing Certificate of Death.

ESCAPE FROM INDUSTRIAL.

Five Girls Elude Watchers-Switch man Geo. Burke Severely Injured ---Meeting of High Priests of Weber.

Ogden, Utah, May 26 .- Over the burial of a Chinaman named Wong Mo, who died last Monday morning, a great deal of controversy has arisen between Undertaker Lindquist, City Physician Dickson and Sanitary Inspector Power, which may result in the matter being investigated by the state board of health as well as the local board of health.

The undertaker claims that he was called Monday morning to go to a Chinese hut on Twenty-eighth street ind get the body of a Chinaman who had died about 4.89 that morning, which he did, and removed the body to his had died about 4.39 that morning which h did, and removed the body to his mergue. I am paid by the city to care for the in-digent sick and to sign death certi-neates for indigent dead, but this was not a city case. The Chinaman had not been a city charge, he had money, and from that I suppose the undertaker has or will get his pay, and I had a right to ask a fee for my services the same as the undertaker did, and the fee I asked was the minimum charge for making an examination of a dead Chinaman and to sign a death certificate as to the cause of his death." Sanitary Inspector Power said: "The facts concerning our visit Thursday morning to the undertakers are: Dr. Dickson and I were going out on some other business but to accommodate Mr. Lindquist, I went to his place and asked him "Have you the certificate signed for the Chinaman's death, so I can issue you the permit?" to which he repiled, "We'll get the certificate signed if we have to go to the state board of health." To that remark Mr. Powers answered, "We'll, if that's your feeling in the case go ahead, but don't bury the body until the permit is is-sued." About 10:30" the certificate was

sued." About 10:30 the certificate was brought to Mr, Power's office signed by Peter Shupe and Emil Keller, on this certificate Mr. Power refused to issue

A short time afterwards the certificate was brought to Mr. Power signed by Dr. Baker, giving the cause of death as "general debility," on this the burial permit was issued. Mr. Power said that Dr. Baker will be ordered to appear before the board of health to explain why he signed the certificate, as he thinks it was very irregular for him to do so. He further stated "This is not the first time Mr. Lindquist has had difficulty with the board of health. He was cited before the board once before for burying a Chinaman without securing a death certificate, first, and a short time ago when he buried a Chinaman, Dr. Dick-son accommodated him and signed the certificate, but notified him that he certificate, but notified him that he would not sign any more of those cer-tificates without proper investigation, and that it was not his duty to sign

GIRLS ESCAPE FROM INDUSTRIAL. Five young girl inmates of the State Industrial school made their escape day. The Hanks girl refused to ride in the open box car hence was caught here in Ogden. Should it be ascertained that someone assisted them in making their scape, the parties will be severely punished.
