

## HEPBURN SPONSOR FOR LABOR BILL

Measure Prepared After Confer-  
ences With the President  
Is Introduced.

NO FORECAST OF ACTION.

Leaders Are Unable to Say What the  
Fate of the Act Will Be—Intended  
To Modify Sherman Provisions.

Washington, March 23.—The bill prepared by the National Civic Federation, after conferences with the president and representatives of capital and labor, to relieve the stringency of the Sherman anti-trust law, was introduced in the house today by Representative Hepburn of Iowa, chairman of the committee on interstate and foreign commerce.

It was referred by Speaker Cannon to that committee for consideration and report, and it is understood that President Roosevelt will, in a message to Congress, make recommendation concerning it.

### FATE NOT FORECASTED.

There is no information on which to frame a prediction of the failure or success of the bill in the house, nor will there be until the hearings have been given in committee. Party leaders today professed to be wholly ignorant of the details of the bill and to have only a general understanding of its purpose.

One of the most interesting sections of the bill is that which seeks to relieve organized labor from the suppressive effects of the recent supreme court decision declaring that labor unions are conspiracies in restraint of trade and therefore unlawful. The bill, broadly speaking, aims to restore the unions their right of peaceable existence, including the right to strike, but leaving them still amenable to the Sherman act in the matter of boycotts, picketing and similar coercive practices. The section is as follows:

### RIGHT TO STRIKE.

"Nothing in said act, approved July 2, 1890, or in this act, is intended, nor shall any provision thereof hereafter be enforced, so as to interfere with, or to restrict any right of employees to strike for any cause or to combine or to contract with each other or with employers for the purpose of peaceably obtaining from employers satisfactory terms for their labor or satisfactory conditions of employment, or so as to interfere with any right of any right of employees for any cause to discharge all or any of their employees, or to combine or to contract with each other or with employers for the purpose of peaceably obtaining labor on satisfactory terms."

### REGISTRATION NECESSARY.

The bill introduced today does not attempt to change the legal status of anything condemned as in restraint of trade under the Sherman anti-trust act but it aims to provide a way by which, under certain conditions, combinations and contracts in restraint of trade that are not unreasonable may be saved from attack. The benefits and immunities offered by the proposed bill therefore will be in the main confined to those who register in accordance with the terms of the bill.

Common carriers may register with the interstate commerce commission, and all others with the commissioner of corporations in the department of commerce and labor. It is proposed to amend section 7 of the Sherman anti-trust act by cutting out the provision for three-fold damages, reducing the amount that can be collected to simple damages, as under the common law. Everybody, whether registered or not, will get the benefit of this provision.

Both corporations for profit and having capital stock, and also corporations not for profit and not having capital stock, may register, but neither are obliged to do so. This description is intended to include co-operative organizations, as well as business corporations, agricultural and labor organizations and the like. If they do register they get the benefits of the act. If they do not register, they remain under the Sherman anti-trust law unamended.

## CHINA'S INVITATION

Minister Wu is Asked to Invite American Battleships to Pay Celestial a Visit.

Washington, March 23.—China, through Minister Wu, its diplomatic representative in Washington, has extended a cordial invitation for the American battleship fleet to stop in China on its way around the world. On receipt of a dispatch from the minister of foreign affairs for China today, indicating that instructions have been given to welcome the vessels, Mr. Wu promptly sent a letter to Secretary Root. The letter was absent from the department today, and the communication will be laid before him tomorrow. The cablegram upon which Mr. Wu based his invitation came from the minister of foreign affairs at Peking substantially in the following words:

"As the American fleet is to visit the far east, we have given telegraphic instructions to the viceroy at Nanking to make suitable preparations, in conjunction with Admiral Sahn, the ranking officer of the navy, to welcome the fleet to Chinese shores."

It is hoped at the legation that a favorable reply will be made by this government to the invitation, and the officials at the legation are confident that a hearty reception will be given to the officers and men of the fleet whenever the ships may stop.

Shanghai is the only port of any consequence in the vicinicity of Nanking, so evidently it is the expectation of the Chinese home authorities that the fleet will stop there in the event that the government feels that any more stops than those already announced should be made.

Information has reached the navy department that New Zealand and Tahiti have similar invitations on the way by mail.

### RIDGELY IN CONTROL.

Comptroller of Currency Heads National Bank of Commerce.

Kansas City, March 23.—The National Bank of Commerce, which failed during the recent financial disturbance, with liabilities of \$39,000,000, will reopen for business on Monday next, with W. B. Ridgely, comptroller of the currency, as president; George T. Cutts, formerly of New York and St. Louis, vice president; Edward Ridgely, New York, cashier.

The first legal move in the reorganization plan was taken today, when the stockholders met and formally voted to increase the capital stock from \$1,000,000 to \$2,000,000 and to increase the number of directors from 15 to 21.

Wednesday the stockholders will meet and formally pay over to Receiver Cutts \$3,850,000. This money will represent the additional \$1,900,000 capital and the money subscribed to take up slow paper held by the bank.

### ORIENTAL BANK RESUMES.

New York, March 23.—Five hundred thousand dollars which had been deposited by savings banks with the Oriental bank before the latter institution suspended payment several weeks ago, was paid to the savings banks today. The payment was made under the plan which had been approved by depositors and which finally was approved by the courts in the face of opposition on the part of Atty.-Gen. Jackson. The Oriental bank reopened its doors to its depositors again today, and about a dozen of them turned in their pass-books to be balanced after which they will be paid in full. Announcement was made today by counsel for the bank that the payments to all depositors probably will be completed within two weeks.

New York, March 24.—While John A. Cisko, an aged retired banker, lay dying of pneumonia in his residence on Fourth street, near Fifth avenue, his wife, worn out by her devoted attendance upon him and shocked by the verdict of physicians that he could not recover, committed suicide last night in an adjoining room by turning on the gas. Mr. Cisko's condition is so critical that he has not been informed of his wife's death.

### FRENCHMAN GOT RICH ON WORTHLESS PAPER

Paris, March 23.—A sensation has been caused by the arrest here this afternoon of a man named Henri Rochette on the charge of conducting successful swindles on an enormous scale. Rochette was one of the writers in an obscure French town. He came to Paris to seek his fortune, in which he was eminently successful so long as he could keep out of the clutches of the law. He founded the Franco-Spanish bank and held not less than a dozen mining enterprises in which he was a director and whose stock was eagerly purchased by French investors. He now develops that his methods were fraudulent, and the complaint against him alleges that he has stolen over \$12,000 through the medium of his various companies and societies. He is compared to the celebrated M. Humbert, who with the difference that while M. Humbert borrowed money in order to pay interest on previous loans, Rochette continually organized new companies and issued new stock.

It is charged that he manipulated the assets of his companies by means of false balance sheets. Coincidentally with Rochette's arrest the quotations on the stock companies in which he was interested experienced a heavy decline.

The mines promoted by Rochette, mostly of coal and copper, were in Spain. His capitalizations aggregated more than \$29,000,000. Sixty branches of his so-called enterprises were strung through France.

San Diego, Cal., March 23.—Max Willis, said to be wanted in New York City on an embezzlement charge, was traced here tonight on information furnished by a representative of the Pinkerton detective agency.

### CROKER ENTERS SUIT.

Dublin, March 23.—Richard Croker, the former leader of Tammany Hall of New York, has instituted a suit for libel against the Manchester Sporting Chronicle for statements published in that paper reflecting on his character as a sportsman.

### LABOR LOOKS BRIGHTER.

Schenectady, N. Y., March 23.—The 10,000 employees of the General Electric company in this city who have been working four days a week for two months will shortly go on full time, as a result of large orders recently received.

### SERGEANT WAS DESPONDENT.

Havana, March 23.—Sergeant Rudolph Kranz of the Thirtieth infantry committed suicide here in the cemetery. He left a letter saying that he was despondent because he had unjustly been denied promotion.

### EXTRAORDINARY ATTACK OF SULZER UPON MANN

Washington, March 23.—A scene some what out of the ordinary was enacted in the house of representatives today because of a charge made by Mr. Mann (Illinois) that Mr. Sulzer (New York) had put in the Congressional Record what purported to be a speech delivered by him last Saturday, but which Mr. Mann charged was not the one delivered. It all had to do with Mr. Sulzer's claim that he and not Mr. Mann, was the author of the legislation which brought the department of commerce and labor into being. A resolution offered by Mr. Mann to expunge the printed speech from the record was adopted by a strict party vote, but not until after the house had been treated to a bitter denunciation of Mr. Mann by Mr. Sulzer and several lively tilts between the latter and the speaker.

Albany, N. Y., March 23.—Mayor McClean and Police Commissioner Blighman of New York today filed with Governor Hughes their answers to the charges recently filed against them by the Rev. Dr. Charles H. Parkhurst, as president of the Society for the Prevention of Crime, of New York City. Both officials entered a denial of the charges.

### EXPECT TO GET BANDITS.

Three Men Who Stole \$47,000 Are Being Pursued Vigorously.

Reno, Nev., March 23.—The three bandits who held up Edward Hoffman and secured \$47,000 belonging to the Coalition Mining company yesterday made their way to Schurz during the night, stole a hand car and made their way into the Walker Indian reservation. They are now being pursued by former members of the Walker Indian police and are headed for Buckbrush Springs, the only place the freight train makes where water can be secured. Their course indicates they trying to reach Reno.

Sergeant Lundy of the Nevada state police stated this afternoon that his men under him are on guard. The belief is expressed that the robbers will be captured within 48 hours.

### LAI OFF OPERATOR AND FOUR ARE DEAD

Lexington, Ky., March 24.—Four persons were killed and 20 injured in the wreck of a passenger train between Burgin and High Bridge, early today, on the Queen and Crescent railway. The wreck was a collision between a Bige Grass special passenger train and a freight train. The freight train is said to have come through without orders, the night operator having been laid off.

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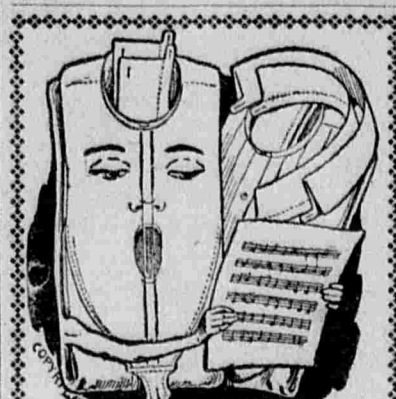
