FATE NOT FORECASTED.

There is no information on which to frame a prediction of the failure or success of the bill in the house nor will there be until the hearings have been given in committee. Party leaders today professed to be wholly ignorant of the details of the bill and to have only a general understanding of its pur-

One of the most interesting sections of the federation bill is that which seeks to relieve organized labor from the suppressive effects of the recent su-preme court decision declaring that lapreme court decision declaring that la-bor unions are conspiracies in restraint of trade and therefore uniawful. The bill, broadly speaking, aims to restor-the unions their right of peaceable ex-istence, including the right to strike, but leaving them still amenable to the Sherman act in the matter of boycotts, picketing and similar coercive practises The section is as follows:

RIGHT TO STRIE.

"Nothing in said act, approved July 2, 1890, or in this act, is intended, nor shall any provision thereof hereafter be enforced, so as to interfere with, or be enforced, so as to interfere with, or to restrict any right of employes to strike for any cause or to combine or to contract with each other or with employers for the purpose of peaceably obtaining from employers satisfactory terms for their labor or satisfactory conditions of employers, or so as to interfere with or to restrict any right of employers for any cause to dis-charge all or any of their employees, or to combine or to contract with each other or with employes for the pur-pose of peaceably obtaining labor on satisfactory terms."

REGISTRATION NECESSARY.

The bill introduced today does not at-tempt to change the legal status of anything condemned as in restraint of trade under the Sherman anti-trust act but it aims to provide a way by which, under certain conditions, combinations and contracts in restraint of trade that are not unreasonable may be saved from attack. The benefits and immu-nities offered by the proposed bill there-fore will be in the main confined to those who register in accordance with the terms of the bill. Common carriers may register with

Common carriers may register with the interstate commerce commission, and all others with the commissioner of corporations in the department of commerce and labor. It is proposed to trust act by cutting out the provision for thee-fold damages, reducing the amount that can be collected to simple dumages, as under the common law. Everybody, whether registered or not, will get the benefit of this provision. Both corporations for profit and hav-ing capital stock, and also corporations not for profit and not having capital stock, may register, but neither are obliged to do so. This description is intended to include co-operative organ-izations, as well as bushness corpora-tions and the like. If they do register they get the benefits of the act. CHINA'S INVITATION

lestials a Visit,

March 23.-China Washington.

Washington, March 23.—China, through Minister Wu, its dipiomatic representative in Washington, has ex-tended a cordial invitation for the American battleship fleet to stop in China on its way around the world. On receipt of a dispatch from the minister of foreign affairs for China today, indicating that instructions have been given to welcome the vessels. Mr. Wu promptly sent a letter to Secy. Root. The latter was absent from the department today, and the commu-nication will be laid before him tomor-row. The cablegrain upon which Mr. Wu based his invitation came from the minister of foreign affairs at Pekin substantially in the following words: . As the American fleet is to visit the far east, we have given telegraphic in-

far east, we have given telegraphic in-structions to the viceroy at Nanking to make suitable preparations, in conunction with Admiral Sah, the ranking officer of the navy, to welcome the fleet

to Chinese shores. It is hoped at the legation that a favorable reply will be made by this government to the invitation, and the officials at the legation are confident that a hearty reception will be given to the officers and men of the fleet wher-ever the ships may stop. Shanghai is the only port of any con-sequence in the viceroyalty of Nanking, so evidently it is the expectation of the Chinese home authorities that the fleet will stop there in the event that the government feels that any more stops than those already announced should be made. e made Information has reached the navy de-

LAID OFF OPERATOR AND FOUR ARE DEAD

ORIENTAL BANK RESUMES. New York, March 23.-Five hundred thousand dollars which had been de-posited by savings banks with the Ori-ental bank before the latter institu-tion suspended payment several weeks ago, was paid to the savings banks to-day. The payment was made under the plan which had been approved by de-positors and which finally was approv-ed by the courts in the face of opposi-tion on the part of Atty.-Gen, Jackson. The Oriental bank reopened its doors to its depositors again today, and about a dozen of them turned in their pass-books to be balanced, after which they will be paid in full. Announcement was made today by counsel for the bank that the payments to all deposit-ors probably will be completed within two weeks. Lexington, Ky., March 24 .-- Four persons were killed and 20 injured in the wreck of a passenger train between Burgin and High Bridge, early today, on the Queen and Crescent railway. The wreck was a collision between a Blue Grass special passenger train and a freight train. The freight train is said to have come through without orders, the night operator having been laid off.

It is charged that he manipulated the assets of his companies by means of false balance sheets. Coincident with Rochette's arrest the quotations on the stock companies in which he was interested experienced a heavy decline. The mines promoted by Rochette, mostly of coal and copper, were in Spain. His capitalizations aggregated more than \$29,000,000. Sixty branch-es of his so-called enterprises were strung through France.
