The first witness examined for the The first witness examined for the rosecution was Dr. H. S. Scott, of Salt Lake City, who testified that on Sun-day, January 19, he, in company with Dr. Beatty, of Salt Lake, came to Og-den, via the R. G. W. at request of Dr. A. S. Condon; that they went out to the Ogden pest house and there saw a man suffering from smallpox, a named Thomas Morrison; that they made a thorough examination of the made a thorough examination of the patient and found that he was suffer-ing from smallpox, and scaling off; that the case was not as severe as many he had seen, but was by no means one of the mildest cases of the disease. The doctor in answer to the question as to what he should wear and how he would disinfect his clothing in visiting smallpox said that he had a long coat which he wore on the occasion of visiting the Ogden hospital which covered his body, fitting clos at the neck and covering all his cloth-ing; that he put the coat on when entering the pest house and took it off when he came out. That besides this precaution he disinfected his clothing thoroughly with formaldehyde gas, and washed his hands and face in a Sisinfecting solution. Dr. Scott was asked what a person

going around smallpox should disinfect with to which he replied with beichloride of mercury or formaldehyde gas or tome other strong antiseptic that would thoroughly disinfect the clothing worn. To the question asked as to whether a 5 per cent solution of car hele acid would be a sufficient disin-fectant the dector suff that it would ; that corbolic acid as a disinfectant had been over estimated in the past and is used but very little by physicians as a disinfectant. The docter said that it was possible to disinfeet with carbolic acid by taking a thorough bath with a 5 per cent soluing to the pest house he had asked Mr. and Mrs. Groome to take care of the patient and have the nurse re-leased.
