Dinner was served in the pavilion which was an elegant spread consisting of eleven courses. The place covered the main hall rendered some very nice selections. There were about 250 people over the age of sixty present. 27 of whom had seen the Prophet Joseph Smith. Lehi had passed their 80th birthday and their 70th birthday.
