

CONVENTIONS IN NEBRASKA

Feature of Democratic One Was A Speech by William Jennings Bryan.

TARIFF REVISION FAVORED.

Republicans Endorse the Administration and Taft as Pre-eminently Qualified for Party Leadership.

Lincoln, Neb., Sept. 24.—Under the new state-wide convention law, this was the day designated for all political parties represented on the primary ballot to hold their state platform conventions.

Of the five parties, first—the Republican, Democratic and Populist—gathered the largest numbers. The Prohibitionists held no convention, and the Socialists were without representation save for one delegate.

The feature of the Democratic convention was the speech of William J. Bryan. He congratulated the party, state and national, on having emerged from the valley of the shadow of death.

Mr. Bryan assisted in drafting the platform, and its declaration are assumed to reflect his views of what the national party declarations should be in 1908.

The platform approves of the laws prohibiting the pass and rebate, and insists on further legislation making it unlawful for any corporation to contribute to campaign funds.

It opposes the centralization idea, and declares for the election of United States senators by direct vote.

Immediate revision of the tariff is urged and an income tax favored.

On the question of trusts the platform says, in part: "A private monopoly is indefensible and intolerable. We therefore favor the vigorous enforcement of the criminal law against trusts and trust magnates, and demand the enactment of such additional legislation as may be necessary to make it impossible for a private monopoly to exist in the United States."

Declarations are made for state and national boards of trade and an eight-hour day, against government by injunction, and for protection of foreigners.

An unqualified endorsement of President Roosevelt's administration and leadership is given in the Republican platform. A continuation of his policies is insisted on, and in reference to Secy. Taft is made as follows:

"While not presuming to forestall the action of any future convention, we express the belief that the Republicans of Nebraska recognize in William H. Taft of Ohio one whose personal character and whose long public service mark him as pre-eminently the man under whose leadership these policies would be perpetuated."

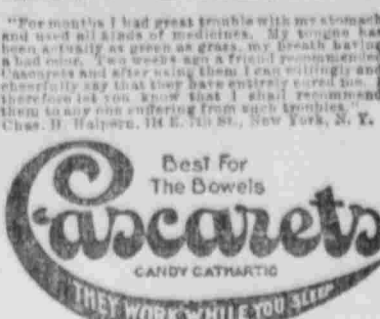
The platform declares the Republican party of the state committed to the following reforms, which it has inaugurated:

A state-wide direct primary. Abolition of the free pass evil. Comprehensive powers for the state railway commission. More equitable rates for transportation of passengers and freight.

Equal taxation of railway property for city purposes. Abolition of the fellow servant law and full employers' liability.

GOV. FOLK WILL GET BACK PAY AS CIRCUIT ATTY.

St. Louis, Mo., Sept. 24.—Decision was rendered today by Circuit Judge Kinsey in the suit of Gov. Folk to obtain back salary at the rate of \$3,000 a year.

The decision holds that as circuit attorney the salary due to Gov. Folk should be rated at \$4,000. Under the decision, Gov. Folk will receive in back pay from the city of St. Louis \$2,952, instead of \$3,532 for which he sued.

VIOLENT ERUPTION OF MAKUSHIN CONFIRMED.

Seattle, Wash., Sept. 24.—Capt. A. J. Henderson, of the revenue cutter Thetis, on arrival here today, from an Arctic expedition, confirms with official reports accounts of a violent volcanic eruption of Mount Makushin on Sept. 1, and the existence of a new peak rising from the sea, forming a part of the Hagerstrom formation.

The Makushin volcano was threatening for six hours, before heavily impregnated with sulphur fumes, a depth of three-eighths of an inch. The mountain is 25 miles from Unalaska. Reports made to Capt. Henderson in the north state three other similar volcanic eruptions, one along the coast of the Alaska coast during the present summer.

CABRERA WILL SUPPORT BONILLA'S CLAIMS.

Berlin, Sept. 24.—According to official information received today, President Cabrera of Guatemala has notified President Davila of Honduras that Guatemala will support Manuel Bonilla of Honduras in the latter's efforts to regain the presidency of Honduras.

Washington, Sept. 24.—The underlying cause for the action of General Cabrera in trying to influence Honduras in the selection of a president in the coming election, is said to be President Cabrera's desire to insure an ally to strengthen his position against Mexico, which government, he fears, is likely to make the effort to secure the punishment of the Guatemalan officials charged with participation in the assassination of the former president.

Reports of Guatemala's activity in Honduras politics have hastened the conclusion of negotiations towards the assembling of the peace conference in Washington next November. With the recent signature of the Central American peace protocol, both the United States and Mexico believe the danger of an outbreak has been averted.

The protocol binds the parties to it to refrain from any move that might disturb the status quo and thus endanger the success of the projected conference, and as the officials here feel that any attempt of Guatemala to interfere with the internal affairs of Honduras, which state would be in violation of that protocol, it is not doubted here that the movement in favor of Bonilla will be kept within the bounds of propriety.

MILK PRICES RAISED.

New York, Sept. 24.—Milk will sell in this city at a higher price this winter than it has commanded in a generation, and probably, say the dealers, at the highest price it has ever brought here.

The changes will go into effect on Oct. 1. Nine cents a quart will be charged for bottled milk, instead of 5 cents.

MAYOR TAYLOR BADLY BEATEN IN CONVENTION.

San Francisco, Sept. 24.—Daniel A. Ryan, an attorney who has been prominent in Republican politics, was nominated for mayor by the Republican municipal convention tonight.

New York, Sept. 24.—Federal Judge Taft today has today appointed Adrian Joline and Douglas Robinson receivers for the New York City Railway company, on a joint application of creditors and officials of the company.

WESTERN YARDMEN GET INCREASE OF WAGES.

Denver, Sept. 24.—Announcement was made here today that E. E. Clark, member of the interstate commerce commission who was appointed to arbitrate the differences between western railroad men and the railroad in the railway yardmen's strike, has granted the claim of the yardmen for 2 cents a day more than is paid on eastern roads.

MINNESOTA RATE WAR.

St. Paul, Sept. 24.—Atty.-Gen. Young today obtained from the county court a writ of mandamus directed against the Northern Pacific Railroad company to compel it to comply with the commodity rate law, whose operation was enjoined by Judge Lechner of the United States court.
