Reports of Guatemala's activity in Hondurau politics have hastened the conclusion of negotiations towards the assembling of the peace conference in Washington next November. ### MILK PRICES RAISED.

New York, Sept. 24.-Milk will sell in New York, Sept. 24.—Milk will sell in this city at a higher price this winter than it has commanded in a generation, and probably, say the dealers, at the highest price it has ever brought here. Two of the big milk concerns already have announced an increase in prices, one applying to the retail trade in bottled milk and the other to wholesale or can delivery.

The changes will go into effect on Oct. 1. Nine cents a quart will be charged for bottled milk, instead of 8 cents.

This unprecedented price for milk is explained as being due in part to an actual shortage in the supply, which has existed for a year. The principal causes, however, are the increased demands of the dairy farmers and the increased cost of bottling and deliver-

New York, Sept. 24.-Federal Judge

New York, Sept. 24.—Federal Judge Lacomb here today appointed Adrian Joline and Douglas Robinson receivers for the New York City Railway company, on a joint application of creditors and officials of the company.

The New York City Railway company is one of the numerous corporations formed in the various merges of traction and subway lines in this city. The New York City Railway company guarantees certan dividends in Metropolitan Street Railway stocks. These dividends amount to about \$2.000,000 a year short of earnings required to pay the dividends. Ever since the consolidation of the surface, elevated and subway lines in this city under the name of the Interborough-Metropolitan company, it has been understood that the subway and elevated lines were more than holding their own, but that the surface lines operated by the Interborough-Metropolitan were not earning their fixed charges and dividends.

### WESTERN YARDMEN GET INCREASE OF WAGES.

Denver, Sept. 24.—Announcement was made here today that E. E. Clark, member of the interstate commeace commission who was appointed to arbitrate the differences between western railroads and the Brotherhood of Rallway Trainmen over the 2-cent differential demanded for yardmen on the railroads west of the Missouri river, has granted the claim of the yardmen for 2 cents an hour more than is paid on eastern roads. At the recent conference held in Denver, following the strike of the yardmen on the Colorado & Southern railroad, which threatened to spread and tie up all western roads, the companies conceded a differential of 1 cent and agreed to refer to arbitration the question of paying the other cent demanded. Arbitrator Clark's decision will increase the wages of 3,000 vard ween the mouth. cision will increase the wages of 3,000 yard men \$5 a month.
