Chicago Church Choir.—Of the Chicago Church Choir Opera Company, which is promised to open at Walker's Opera House on the 17th inst., the Chicago Inter Ocean says: "The Church Choir Company last evening gave their first presentation of Gilbert & Sullivan's 'Iolanthe.' Musically, the opera was given in a style that has not been surpassed in this city, and the ensemble had a strength that agreeably surprised an audience inclined to be more critical than friendly."

"The choruses were superb, both for strength and finish of music, and the principals were surprisingly good."

Right of Way.—The Salt Lake and Fort Douglas Railway Corporation, which has in view the running of a road from the Utah Central depot, up North Temple Street, along the line of the aqueduct, via the mouth of City Creek Canyon, and over the north and east benches to the military post on the hill, last evening asked the City Council for the right of way over the route proposed. The incorporators are: Seymour B. Young, James T. Little, James Sharp, P. W. Williams, Le Grand Young, W. L. Miller, John Sharp, Jr., Alfalfa Young, A. F. Doremus and J. Fawcett Smith.

**Salt Lake Music Hall.**—The above is the name of a building lately erected on the corner of First South and Fourth West Streets, one block south of the Utah Central depot. It was commenced Nov. 8th and has been energetically pushed ahead to its completion. E. T. Ash-ton having the mason work and G. W. Price the carpentering. The proprietors of the building are Messrs. E. E. Gillis and T. C. Griggs. The structure is two stories high, and the upper room, which is designed for public entertainment, is 61 by 31 feet inside, with a 14-foot ceiling. The stage is 16 feet by 31. Convenient dressing rooms on the ground floor will be approached by a hallway on the west side of the building, from which a stairway leads to the stage above. It is the design to fit up the stage for dramatic performances, etc.

The ground floor front has four stores, one of which will be occupied by grain and provisions, and another by a meat-market. The other two are yet unengaged. The building will be opened on Monday evening, December 17th, by a social reception of the Bihopric and leading members of the ward, in which the Choir, Orchestra and Glee Club will take part, also Prof. Thomas' Theatre Orchestra.

**Home from Minnesota.**—Elder Samuel Bryson, Jr., of Woodruff, Rich County, who left here on a mission to the Northwestern States, September 4th, 1882, returned home a few days ago. He labored all the time with the exception of ten days, in the State of Minnesota, in the Counties of Otsego, Fillmore, Todd and Morrison. The ten days mentioned were spent in Wisconsin, visiting with Elder Mose Anderson's companion in the field the latter's relatives.

After this he was with Elder Heber Bannion in Todd and Morrison counties, and then with Elder Thomas S. Woodland, in the same localities. They found numbers of opportunities to preach, held ninety-four meetings in Minnesota (upwards of seventy in Todd County), but no baptisms resulted. They found friends as a general thing, and when Elder Bryson left, two or three families were investigating the doctrines he advocated. His health was good, though the weather was extremely cold, and he returns feeling well repaid by his missionary experience.

**The Sevier River Drowning.**—Telegrams from Sevier County have already been published in relation to the drowning and subsequent recovery of the body of a child named Curtis, in the Sevier River several days ago. A correspondent from Aurora, where the fatality occurred, sends a few more particulars. The little one whose life was lost was a son of Ezra and Mary Ann Curtis, aged five years, six months and nine days.

It accidentally fell into the water, and the body was missing for three days and nights, during which it was hunted for by nearly the whole of the male portion of the settlement, as well as others from Salina and places near by. The river was searched for miles with grab-bags, pitchforks, hay-rakes, etc., and the body was at length found lodged upon a sand-bar.

**The Green River Murder.**—The *Provo Register* gives the following account of the murder at Green River, mentioned hitherto in our columns:

"The murderer said to have been a most cold blooded and unprovoked affair. The particulars, as given to us are as follows: Geo. Fellows, or 'Shooter,' as he was usually called, was spending with a friend in one of the saloons, for amusement, when Dick Kelly, who had formerly been an employee of the D. & R. Co., came in and insisted on also taking a hand. He was asked to leave and was told that they were waiting merely for fun. This enraged Kelly, and he had to be removed by one or two of his friends. Soon after Fellows invited a number of his friends to a drink, and Kelly overheard Fellows, stepped up and said, 'Yes, I'll drink with you, G—d—in you,' and drawing his right arm, the ball going clear through the body. Kelly is said to have been drunk at the time. Had it not been for the timely arrival of Deputy Marshal Kendall, there is no doubt but what attempts would have been made to lynch Kelly.

The murderer was brought to Provo and remained in jail till last Monday, when he was taken before U. S. Commissioner A. O. Smoot, Jr., pleaded not guilty, waived examination and was remanded to the County Jail. He will very likely stay confined till the Grand Jury meets next May.
