Ogden Junction, Sept. 2--

One of the dirtiest newspaper tricks we ever heard of was perpetrated yesterday by the Evanston Age. We published last Saturday evening an article entitled "A Word for Wyoming" in which we advocated the cause of the people of Uinta County, and recommended certain gentlemen as the best candidates in the field, for election.

The Junction has a large circulation in Wyoming and last Saturday's issue had to be enlarged to meet the demand for the editorial in question. Yesterday the Age copied the article, substituting the

names of the candidates to whom it has sold itself, and making it appear that they were our nominees, inserting the sub-heading "What the Ogden Junction would advise voters to do to-day."

Such a despicable dodge is beneath contempt, and is sufficient to damn the Age's cause among all respectable citizens of Wyoming and Utah.

THE WHISTLE NUISANCE.—The railroad engine steam whistle nuisance is in process of abatement in a number of places. New England is forward in the work. In many cities the use of the whistle has been almost entirely dispensed with. On the Boston and Providence Railroad the engines have been ordered to discontinue the use of the whistle except as a special danger signal. It is not to be employed "in passing other trains, or in approaching crossings or stations, except those regarded as specially dangerous, and in the case of freight trains where it is necessary to inform the station agents and switchmen that the train men will have work at such station. In all other cases the signal must be given by the ringing of the bell."
