SUIT AGAINST THE CITY.

Alleged Pollution of the River Jordan by Sewage Matter.

DAMAGES OF \$3000 ARE CLAIMED.

The Plaintiff is William Langford, who complains loudly of the City.

At a late hour yesterday afternoon William Langford, through his attorneys, Rawlins and Grimes, filed a suit against Salt Lake City, in which the sum of \$3000 and costs is claimed as damages.

Plaintiff states that, for more than seventeen years past he has been the owner of certain premises situated on the Jordan river, in this city, consisting of lots three and four, block six, all of lot 10, 1000, and the south half of lot 10, 1000, and in the third division, Jordan River end in Salt Lake county. During that time he has, with his family, resided on those premises using the land for farm purposes. He further states that the premises were established and constructed, and remained in his possession until about a year ago when he sold them to Mr. Wm. Woods, an attorney, residing in Salt Lake county.

Defendant states that he nothing to do with the sale, that, at the time he sold the same, he had no wife, and was going to go into "the other man's company."

Attorney Martin, on behalf of defendant, says he had no inquiry made concerning the title to the property, and he was not aware that the very last, and he was an employe young man in the time the horses were stolen.
