Bishop's Meeting.—The meeting of the Bishops and Ward officers of the State which was to have been held last night will convene at the Council House, this evening at 8 o'clock.

Arrived Safe.—Hon. George Q. Cannon reached home yesterday, as expected. He is in usual good health and spirits. His family remained in Washington, as his stay here will be but temporary.

Delayed.—In consequence of an accident to our steam engine, which could not be repaired without considerable labor and difficulty, our train en route to the States was unavoidably delayed for several hours. An apology to our patrons, stating the reason for the same, was crowded out of our columns that evening.

The Great Wilhelm.—The great German violinist, Herr August Wilhelm, will give an exhibition of his power and skill as an instrumentalist, at the Theatre, on Friday evening, January 8th, 1880. He comes heralded by the press of both hemispheres as one of the leading, if not the first violinist of the age. We make the following extracts from the leading journals of Europe and America:
"Prof. Wilhelm has taken the most prominent position among the musicians of the day, and is undoubtedly the brightest luminary at the present time in the profession. As a violinist he ranks the first of the age."

"He is up—in power, breadth, beauty of conception and technical delicacy and finish, we have never had his equal here; and it did one's heart good to see the great crowd which greeted him as a master of an honorable living, and they are not ashamed to go to the factories and ask for work. They are proud to provide for their families. We know of some girls in the factory in this city who have been accustomed to rely upon the head of the family for a support, and do nothing for themselves, that are now adding largely to the contribution of the family coffers."
