Two Weeks End Deals—The Elk Fuel company has bought the eld Fifth ward meetinghouse for a coal distributing station, the consideration being \$13,000. The property has a frontage of 10 rods on Third West, and 15 rods on Seventh South street. Another deal was closed up Saturday evening, by which 66 foot front on Fourth South street just east of 8t Paul's church, was bought for \$25,000 by Peterson and Hubbard with a view to improving the property by a three stories European hotel. This is \$350 per front foot, which shows that prices are firm, with an upward tendency in that locality. tendency in that locality.

Stewart's Ordinance Will Probably Go to the Table Again.

STILL TALKING ABOUT LEAKS MAN IS UNDOUBTEDLY INSANE

An Endeavor Will be Made to Get the Outlet Pipe to Work in Order To Count Holes.

While there appears nothing in the natter that should give an excuse or futher delay, or, as the matter tands, anything to talk about, it is altogether within the limits of the robable that much of the time of his evening's session of the city counil, will be consumed by a discussion f the outlet sewer pipe, and that the est of the time will be spent over the Stewarf liquor license measure, which has been pending for so many weeks, and which, last Monday night, gave rise to the sensational charges e by Councilman Stewart regard-what he termed as "bought and

paid for legislation,"
At the last meeting a resolution was adopted which placed within the nower of the mayor and the board of public works, the right to take a waiver from Contractor Cambell and his bondsmen, of their rights, before delivery, in the matter of the outlet sewer pipe, and to forthwith start the pumping plant, for the purpose of ascertaing, if possible how many, and how serious, are the leaks in the pipe, which hitherto have been the pipe, which hitherto have been parent to the mayor, but invisable Chairman McMillan, of the public rks board.
