LOCAL BRIEFS.

Representative William M. McCrea has been appointed secretary of the Republican state committee.

Streeter No. 24, one of the old time Stephensons, is being made over into an emergency car, a second "Red Wagon."

High school girls are talking of organizing a "Women's Relief Corps" as an auxiliary to the battalion of High School cadets.

Logan will have a horse show at the Agricultural college next Saturday, and many horses have been promised. There will be no charge for admission.

Gov. Carter has granted Col. George of the national guard a leave of absence for one week to leave the state. During his absence Col. Lund will fill his place.

E. A. Culbert has bought from M. H. Walker, \$25x155 feet at Third West and Third South streets, for \$15,000. The premises are at present occupied by the Cudahy Packing company.

The postoffice handled, for the six months ending Dec. 31, 27,919 pieces of registered mail, as against 23,293 pieces for the six months ending Dec. 31, 1904. This is a gain of 4,626, or an increase of over 21 pieces for each day.

The contractor on the Salt Lake bath, has found that the lake water seeps through the sand so, that he has had to make a sump where a gasoline engine pumps out the water as quickly as it accumulates. In this way, the work of excavation is not retarded.

A well attended reception was tendered to Rev. Dr. Coburn, the Boston evangelist, Saturday night, at the East Side Baptist church, where he made an address, with musical numbers furnished by Mrs. B. B. Cutler, and Mrs. Stanger.

The Utah Fuel company will open two more miles, one at Castle Gate and one at Sunnyside, in the near future. Forty-one cars of coal reached this city yesterday; 33 from the Rio Grande, and eight over the short line, 1,230 tons.

Wm. Harrison, the youth who tried to escape from the city jail, will have to go back to California to answer to several charges there. Sheriff Joseph Scholz has arrived here from Los Angeles, and he will take him back handcuffed. Harrison is charged with burglary and escaping from jail.

The carload of Utah butter that was recently shipped from this city to Los Angeles, sold there for \$7,500. Mr. Faust, the shipper, thinks quite a business in that line can be worked up. Mr. Faust says southern California has an organization similar to the Manufacturers and Merchants' association here.

James Budge, a prominent Idaho attorney, has removed to Salt Lake and identified himself with the law firm of Stewart & Stewart. Mr. Budge is a son of President Budge of Bear Lake stake, and in all respects an excellent citizen, and one who will prove himself an active and successful member of the Utah bar.

Maxwell R. Brothers, former clerk of the city board of health, left today for an extended visit to Washington, D. C., and to his former home in Mississippi. He expects to return to the city about March 20 and will then prepare to take active charge of the Warren Springs on April 1, when his lease on that resort begins. During his connection with the past city administration as clerk of the board of health, Mr. Brothers made an enviable record in that office and won the highest esteem of all with whom he had dealings, and he has a host of warm friends who wish him well in his new undertaking.

The "See America First" committee of the Commercial club continues to receive nearly 40 letters daily from different sources, official and unofficial, tending congratulations or offering encouragement relative to the movement. Among those sending such communications are the Denver Hotel & Restaurant Keepers' association, H. B. Thornton, chairman of the Transcontinental Passenger association, who says all members of the association who can attend will do so.

PLEAD FOR PROTECTION.

Parents Want Railroads to Build a Viaduct Over Their Tracks.

The committee on teachers and school work of the board of education will meet tomorrow afternoon at 2:30 o'clock and will consider the advisability of asking the city council to join with the board of education in trying to induce the railroad companies to build a viaduct over their tracks for the benefit of the children, who attend the Union school on Third West street, and who live west of the railroad tracks.

There are 233 pupils attending the Union school who live west of the railroad tracks, and it is necessary for them to cross the tracks from two to four times daily. The parents have become somewhat alarmed over a recent accident, in which two men were seriously injured by a train in plain view of a number of school children, and they feel that the danger is too great. Some of them have notified the school authorities that unless some means are provided for their children to cross the tracks they will keep them away from school altogether. It is probable that the agitation will result in the construction of a viaduct.

MAKES RECOMMENDATIONS.

Ex-City Recorder Files Annual Report With Mayor Thompson.

The annual report of former City Recorder Critchlow for the year 1905 has been filed with Mayor Thompson, and in addition to showing the receipts of the office and also of the two departments of the city for the year, it contains some interesting recommendations. He advises that the office of city purchasing agent be created, and an adequate salary fixed for the same. The report also contains a recommendation that the city follow the example of the county and have "See Europe if you will, but see America first" printed on all its stationery. It is also recommended that the number of times which ordinances and notices of intention to make street improvements are published be reduced. The recorder asks that steel filing cabinets be provided for the vault in the office.
