FREE DELIVERY FOR LOCAN.

Inspector Sharp Makes an Investigation and

Winter. Will Go Into Effect About Sept. 1-Negotlations With Indians for Opening Reservation to Begin.

Washington, D. C., April 30,-Postof fice Inspector F. C. Sharp, who was detailed to make an investigation of the need for the esablishment of a free delivery service at Logan, Utah, has made his report to the postoffice department, that the same be established in that city. He recommended that two mounted letter cariers be allowed with horse hire. This is the only way the large territory can be covered satisfactorily, otherwise three carriers will be necessary and that they could not handle the mall every day without returning to the office for a second load of mail. By this mounted carrier system they would get through the first delivery in time to make a second delivery of star route mall to the business section of the city. 
