

# SHOPLIFTERS ARE IN COURT TODAY

Preliminary Hearing of L. Davis and Pretty Ola Hayden Begun.

BOTH PLEAD NOT GUILTY.

Five Skirts and Four Waists Found in Their Possession Identified—Bates' Bail is Increased.

Practically the entire morning session in Judge Diehl's court was taken up today in the preliminary hearing of L. Davis and Pretty Ola Hayden, alleged shoplifters, charged with grand larceny. The case will probably take this afternoon and tomorrow morning before Judge Diehl will decide whether or not they shall be bound over to await the action of the district court.

Davis and the woman were represented by Atty. William Newton and the prosecution is in the hands of Asst. County Atty. Myers. The defense waived the reading of the complaints and pleaded not guilty.
