JUVENILE JUDGE

MAKES A PROTEST

Writes Letter With Reference

To Action of Principal

Barton.

IN EXCLUDING 15 CHILDREN.

He Also Takes Exceptions to Raling of

School Board Officials Who Refused

Roys Admission to School.

The judge of the juvenile court has

submitted a communication to City

Supt. of Schools Christensen in which he takes exceptions to the action of

Principal Barton of the Hamilton school

and the other school board officials who have refused admittance to that school

of 15 boys now confined in the Morris

home, which is located in the Hamilton

school district. The letter of the juve-nile judge follows:

JUDGE BROWN'S LETTER.

I have just been informed that the

boys who belong to the detention home called the Morris school, located at \$00

Park avenue, were refused entrance to the Hamilton school this morning. I must admit that from the fact alone

that some of these boys would be pupils of this school only during the period of their residence in the Hamilton school district, the terms of such residence be-ing from 10 to 40 days, the arrangement

for the Hamilton school is not perfect, but to refuse admittance because of the conduct of the boys, calling them crim-

inals or of an undesirable class, I must make my protest.

AN AVERAGE OF FIFTEEN.

A large number of the residents, how-

ever, have made mistakes, and, there-fore, must have some punishment. Dur-

ing the school year the greater num-ber are those who are habitual truants of the public schools, boys who have repeatedly run away, and are brought into the court for correction, even as

wards of the court, some continue their fault. In the past a period in the Mor-ris school has worked correction. I do

not think that such a boy is a criminal, nor should he be committed to the state industrial school. But these boys should be compelled to do the thing they refuse to do—i, e., go to school and

Since the public schools have open-ed we have had an average of 15 boys

in the Morris school. Parents who have boys in this place justly com-

have boys in this place justly com-plain that they are without school-ing. "Just what my boy likes," said one father. These boys are found to be the backward boys of the school room. They are the ones who cause the teacher the most trouble and are often in the principal's office. Instead

turned a verdict yesterday afternoon completely exonerating the storekeeper. Several witnesses were examined and told what they knew of the man Gardper. Elimore also told his story again and all the circumstances surrounding the case seem to corroborate his state

The testimony revealed nothing of importance beyond what has already been published about the case. The jury deliberated only for a few mo-ments, and then returned the following verdict:
