WHY TEMPLES ARE BUILT.

The following address was delivered the First ward meetinghouse, Liber-atage, Jan. 16, by Recorder Duncan

on this line.

The fact that the Latter-day Saints are the only people who now build temples, for special religious services, makes their distinctive from all other religious services in this age. But they should not be regarded as peculiar because of this; neither should the temples they build be considered muceus sury adjuncts to religious forms of worship and estemonies. The Old Testament furnishes abundant sydence that the Lord always required this chosen people to build temples, and that those temples were not intended for ordinary gatherings for public worship, their limited size precluded that. The temples which the Lord directed to be build, in older times, were reserved for certain sucred rites and ceremonics, in which only the appointed priests, and a built, in olden times, were reserved for certain smered rites and extenomies, in which only the appointed priests, and a scheeted people, were parmitted to purtleipate. Bend the claborate and minute details concerning the construction of the tabernacie in the cilderness, which was, in fact, a temperary, portable, temple structure. The Divine Presence was often manyingst in that hely place, hence it can appropriately be designated a Temple, and it is spoken of as such in the Scriptures. Itead also the explicit statements of detail given by Jehovah to this servant Solomon in regard to the building of that most magnificent and costly of all temples of which we have any record. Then, again, recall the temple restored by the prophet Zorubbabel, and the other built by Herod. The latter, as you know, was destroyed a five years after the cruci-fixion of the Savior, and no other has since been built upon the custern continent.

The Book of Mormon tells us of many temples that were built on this continent and, doubtless, the Lord directed his people to build them, for the same purposes as those He cause of to be spected in Palestine.

It would take too long to cite the many references that are contained in the Scriptures concerning temples, and their holy uses. The 43rd and 44th chapters of Ezekirel are devoted to a longthy and minute descripation of a wondroug temple that is to be created in the latter days, mays, "The Lord, whom we seek shall suddendy come to his temple. He cannot come to "His" temple unless there is one built for him by those whom He delegates to build it. To be "His" temple, if must be one that has been expressly built for and dedicated to Him, and which He has duly accepted and acknowledged. The temples that have been built by the Latter-day saints fulfill these requirements; they have been created to Him, His name is upon them, and we have had abundant evidence that they have been accepted by Him. Therefor, when He comes He can come to His temple.

The reasons for building temples are aumerous, and highly important. First, the Lord has commanded it as stated at verse 39, section 124. Doctrine and Covenants, and many other places in the Doctrine and Covenants. In section 97, verse 10, it is made known that the Lord had given the pattern of our modern temples to the Prophet Loseph Smith, even as He gave the pattern unto His servants in ancient times. The proper form, dimensions, etc., for our temples had to be revealed, because they, necessarily, differ from the temples of former times, for the reason that sacrifice is not now a part of the temple ordinances, and also because, as stated in verse 41, section 124, the Lord purposed to reveal unto His Church, "Things which have been hid from before the foundation of the world, things which have been hid from before the foundation of the world, things that pertain to the dispensation of the rulness of times."
