8 p.m.—Grand entertainment at Opera House.

Seats reserved for visitors and entertainers. General public to occupy balance of space.

### SUNDAY, JUNE 24TH.

10 a. m.—Meeting of Sunday school children at Tabernacle. Visitors occupy stand and choir seats and seats on each side, primaries main body of building, and larger children sides and gallery. Remarks by First Presidency and exercises by the children.

2 p. m.—General meeting at Tabernacle for all except primaries. Addresses by First Presidency.

8 p. m.—General meeting at Tabernacle. Fifteen or twenty five to ten minute addresses by visitors.

### MONDAY, JUNE 25TH.

8:30 a. m.—Temple party drives to Willard City, accompanied by Willard band.

10 a. m.—Meeting and exercises in Willard Tabernacle.

1 p. m.—Lunch.

4 p. m.—Party take train for Salt Lake City.

BRIGHAM CITY, Utah, June 23, 1894.—The Temple workers who with other invited guests of President Lorenzo Snow, left Salt Lake at 2:40 yesterday afternoon, arrived here on time, 4:45 p.m., all in good spirits.

It had been arranged by the authorities here to have the Sunday school children, numbering several hundreds, form a double line from the depot on the street leading up town and have the visitors pass through the ranks; also to have Mayor Peters deliver a speech of welcome extending the freedom of the city; and also music by the band on the arrival of the visitors at the station. A heavy wind accompanied by a fall of rain, which came up a few minutes prior to the arrival of the party at the station, compelled a change of program.

The children were hastily sheltered in the opera house to await the storm blowing over, as the rain fell quite freely when the train pulled in. Mayor Peters omitted his welcoming speech, but the Mendon Silver band gave cheering music. Hundreds of people also remained to receive the visitors, with scores of vehicles to convey them up town. After all were seated in the conveyances, the procession started up town, headed by the band in a carriage, followed by Presidents Woodruff, Cannon and Smith

and members of the party. The rain having subsided, they drove through the principal streets.

By this time the children were out again and formed a double line near Main street, through which the procession passed, the children meantime waving their handkerchiefs as the party moved along. After passing through the chief part of town the visitors were taken to the respective places assigned by the committee of arrangements, where they were to locate during their stay of three days here.

In the evening at 8 o'clock an old time party was held in the opera house ball room, which was well filled. Presidents Cannon and Smith, Elder F. D. Richards, with Bishops Preston and Winder, Elder Angus M. Cannon, and all the rest of the party were in attendance. Dancing was indulged in by old, middle-aged and young alike, and heartily enjoyed. The music was specially chosen for its old-time character, and an excellent orchestra supplied it. Much amusement was occasioned by witnessing the enjoyment of many old members of the party who had not engaged in a dance for a quarter of a century previously. President Woodruff rested and did not attend the party. Scotch reels, Roger de Coverley and other old time dances prevailed, even the oldest gentlemen and ladies in the party participating. At midnight the party dispersed.

The people of Brigham City have fairly outdone themselves in hospitality and kindly feeling, and the visitors fully appreciate it.

This forenoon the party went to Mantua, the beautiful village about five miles east, held a short meeting, took lunch and will return at 4 p.m., then inspecting the waterworks, etc., here.

Tonight an olio will be given in their honor in the opera house.

Tomorrow, Sunday, they will attend meeting in the Tabernacle, and next day will visit Willard City, and will return home on Monday afternoon.

### ANOTHER REPORT.

By mail this morning came the following official report:

On every page of the book of experience common to humanity, there is an intimation that the realities of life do not answer in pleasure to the promises of the imagination; but there was no place for the cynic among the party of Temple workers or their friends who gathered at the U. P. depot yesterday to take the 2:40 p.m. train for Brigham City on a four days' excursion. After a year of labor in that holy place where it has been their pleasure to administer the keys of life and salvation for their fellowmen, they had now met, free from anxiety of any kind, to enjoy the generous hospitality of President Lorenzo Snow and the Saints of Box Elder Stake; and the quiet enjoyment to be seen in their countenances told of the esteem in which they held the privilege of indulging in what had been promised them, a sacred excursion.

Each member of the party had previously been furnished with a badge consisting of a white silver tasselled ribbon six inches in length, bearing a blue imprint of the Salt Lake Temple,
