SALT LAKE DOUNTY.

When Millard County was com-pleted the usual rule of taking up the counties in their alphabetical order was varied from, and the Salt Lake County retarms were opened. There were in attendance, besides the members of the board and occathe members of the board and occa-sionally some of the Utah commis-sion, Judge Powers, Arthur Brown, H. S. M. Callum, Col. Ferguson, Walter Murphy, Geo. M. Cannon, Judge C. F. Lukeborough, W. J. Lynch, C. E. Allen, J. R. Morris and Sam. H. Gilson.

The First Precinct, Salt Lake City, was commenced with.

Judge Lukeborough claimed that the votes cast for John H. Rumel, Jr., could not be counted for John H. Rumel. The "Liberal" representatives wanted to be heard on this point.

In the first poll the Judges certified to votes for J. H. Rumel, and in the second poll of the first Pre-cinct it was John H. Rumel, Jr. The Second Precinct was then counted. In Poll I there was no

counted. In Four Function asked tally sheet, and Mr. Brown asked that that fact be noted, as it might be of some importance. The secbe of some importance. The sec-ond poll was in a similar position, and the item was noted.

Judge Smith-In Poll 2, Second Precinct, the judges of election refused to count the votes for com-missioners to locate university lands, although votes were cast for them.

Judge Judd-What made them do that? The names were on the ticket.

Judge Smith-They simply refused.

In Poll 3, the abstract showed 71 votes for J. B. Toronto for treasurer, and the tally sheet 77. The beard accepted the latter figure, to which Ferguson and Judge Powers Col. The vote of the board on objected. the question was: Aye: Sells, Judd, Riter, Smith, No: Anderson.

In Poil 1, Third Precinct, one tally sheet showed 313 for Fergus Ferguson for county clerk, and the other tally sheet and the abstracts showed 308. This made a difference of five votes. The board accepted the 308 figure, with the understanding that Prosecuting Alterney-

In the same poll the same condithe figures being 319 and 314. The latter was accepted with the same understanding as in the former case.

In poll 2, Fourth Precinct, on one tally sheet Allen had 109 for county clerk, but it was totalled 104, and on the other tally sheet and both ab-stracts it was 104. The latter figure was accepted, with the same provision as in the former cases.

In Poll 1, Fifth Precinct, J. H. Rumel had 124 votes on one tally sheet and 129 votes on one tany sheet and 129 on the other. The abstract showed 129, and the latter figure was accepted. Barnes, for sheriff, had 218 on one tally sheet and 217 on the other; 218 was on the abstracts. Burt had 133 on one tal-ly sheet and 138 ou the other; abstracts 133. The abstracts were accepted in all cases. Toronwere accepted in all cases. Toron-to had on one tally sheet 149; on the other 151.; abstracts 151. Lorenzo Cracroft had 140 on one tally sheet ank 144 on the other; abstracts 144. Cushing had 129 on one tally sheet and 124 on the other shere at 124.

the other; abstracts 124. In Poll 2, Fifth precinct, the tally sheets totalled 284, but the judges had made it 289, and so certified on the abstracts. The last named figure was accepted, with the understanding that if the result was affected the ballots would be examined.

In Bluff Dale there was one ballot cast for the Independent Workingmen's ticket, and the judges instead of designating the names of the candidates, merely reported it as one Independent ticket. This ticket would have given the Work-ingmen's candidates one vote more.

There was only one tally sneet instead of two from Poll 1, Bingham precinct.

Arthur Brown filed an objection to the counting of the returns from Bingham preciuct, Poll 3, on the ground that most, if not all, of the 41 votes cast were illegal.

In Farmers precinct one tally sheet showed Burt 57, the other 58, and the abstract 58; the 58 tally sheet counted up but 54. The abstract figures were taken.

With the count of Farmers' precinct the board closed its labors for the day, adjourning till 10 a.m. tomorrow, when the remaining eighteen precincts will be counted.

attorney, coroner and surveyor. On the face of the returns the "Liberal" candidates for treasurer and county clerk, will provably have two or three majority. If the re-maining preclucts bear out maining precincts bear out this proportion there will prob-ably be a contest. The Work-ingnien's and People's condidates for recorder and sheriff have a clear majority, Rumel of about 78, aud Burt of about 204. 'The effort of the "Liberals" in relation to Poll 1, First Precinct, is to throw out 261 votes cast for Rumel, the ballots being marked J. H. Rumel, Jr. but the "Jr." being left off the returns by the judges at that poll.

Aug. 20 the canvassing board completed the examination of the Salt Lake County returns, and listened to the arguments of "Liberal" lawyers in favor of a scheme to rob Mr. Rumel of the office of county recorder, because of the failure of a judge of election to put "Jr." in his abstract, and also arguments against referring to the ballot box against referring to the ballot box to correct a discrepancy in the re-turns from Poll 3, Second precinct, by which Toronto and Gallagher have a tie vote for treasur-er. This morning's proceedings began with Granite precinct. When South Cottonwood was reached, Arthur Brown said a number of voters in the precinct had had their names illegally stricken off the hist, and were refused the right of voting. He had sixteen names of persons who had provided the nec-essary proof, and he tendered their votes.
