## Daughters of Pioneers Give Characteristic Ball Tuesday

Several years ago a number of the daughters of people who pioneered the valley of the Great Salt Lake, met together with the idea of commemorating in some notable way the names of the heroes and heroines through whose efforts Utah became colonized, and its foundations of future greatness established.

The meeting resulted in the founding of a society comprising in its membership descendants of the early pioneers, and having for its aim the perpetuation of the memories of early times, the way of frequent gatherings, literary, musical and social, in connection with the society. Since then notable meetings have been held with programs devoted to pioneer reminiscences, and in social affairs, among the last being the popular old-fashioned dances in old-fashioned garb, carried out as the pioneer mothers and fathers in early days managed and enjoyed their social entertainment. Next Tuesday evening another of these pioneer parties will

be given by the society at the Social hall under whose roof the old-time pioneers tripped in the festivities of their day.

A slight idea of these may be gained from the brief account in Bancroft's History of Utah, which reads as follows:

"In winter . . . at the Social hall, private parties were given, when the gathering was too large for the residence of the host. In the basement were appliances for cooking, and adjoining was a dining room with seats and tables sufficient for 200 persons. All entertainments were opened with prayer, then came dancing, songs and music, followed by supper, the guests being dismissed with a benediction at an early hour. The public festivities of the Mormons were always conducted under the auspices of the Church. . . To sing, dance and rejoice before the Lord was regarded almost as a religious duty; but only those must rejoice whose hearts were pure and whose hands were clean. Woe unto them

that dance with guile and malice in their hearts toward their neighbor, proclaimed the council entrusted with charge of the festivities. 'Woe unto them that have secretly injured their neighbor, or his or her property! Woe unto them that are ministers of disorder and of evil! If these shall go forth in the dance without confessing and forsaking their guilt, the faith of the council is that they seal their doom by it.'

"Those who had 'sold liquor for gain, thereby corrupting the morals of society,' were also disqualified. All friends and well wishers to the society, all who remembered the poor and needy were invited, even if not members of the Church."
