County Court.

A motion of the county court was heard yesterday, before Justice Deseret, for removal of appointment of Probate Commissioner of Provo.

A petition was presented from R. H. Collier et al., residents of Provo, George, asking that the same be accepted, and that it be signed by the County, Deseret to Substantiate the same.

Justice Waterman said that he is recommended for serving for Annie Fawcett, a deceased person, interested in the County.

W. H. Miller, asked that T. G. Wimmer, of Provo, be appointed Sheriff Inspector of Clark County.

Other petitions were received asking for the appointment of W. H. Miller, of Ogden, as Sheriff of Clark County, of Clark, New York, for the same term, several days of which were recently set out by the petitioners.

A communication was received from the Family Jewell Co., setting forth the willingness of that company to furnish the U.S. County jail, several cars of which were recently set out by the petitioners.

The county clerk reported a sum to the county from the U. S. Army and the Denver National Guard, of \$1000 for interest.

The court also received the destruction of a batch of old money, warrants, passed in the name of the court.

Democratic Convocation.

The Utah County Democratic convention, held in this city yesterday, adopted a platform organization of members, Chairman, A. J. Evans, of Salt Lake City, vice-chairman, E. A. Wilson, of Provo, second vice-chairman, W. O. Clegg, of Spanish Fork, secretary, John J. H. Hargrave, of Salt Lake City, and treasurer, A. G. Farwell, of Ogden. Several nominative political speeches were made while the reports of committees were being voted on, and delegates to attend the territorial convention at Salt Lake were selected.

Notes.

The Lincoln Republican League club holds a meeting at the Parker school house on Wednesday evening.

Henry Jensen, formerly a grocer in this city, has moved to Springville, where he will engage in the cleaning business.

The Central Utah Wool Co., of Mantua, has filed suit against Eugene, John L. and Brigham Peacock for the recovery of \$20,000, alleged to be due us account.

Elder L. R. Glazier, who has been laboring in the San Joaquin mines since last fall for the past five months, has returned home suffering with the white fever.

Mrs. Minerva Pfeifer is suffering from a sprained ankle and a broken hand, obtained in climbing from a horse on Sunday evening. She will be all right in a few days.

Deputy Marshal Henry has brought to town ex-Marshal Henry's ranch in Morgan, about 40 miles west of here, which was invaded by the grand jury on the charge of assaulting one of the men hands with a revolver.

Marriage licenses were yesterday issued to the following couples: Ephraim N. Wagstaff, 20, and Anna Little Webb, 20, both of American Fork; Orrin Green, 20, and Elizabeth Higgins, 18, both of Ogden; Joseph John Esteves, 20, and Haima M. Andrade, 18, both of Provo.

Another Jordan dam damage suit has been filed against Salt Lake City and the several Jordan river canal companies of Salt Lake County. Daniel W. Thomas, of Lehi, is the plaintiff, and he cites as his causes of action, the aggregate amount sued for amounting to \$4,400.

A similar suit has been filed by the Central Utah Wool company against Bunting Oil Company, of Salt Lake City, and William H. Bunting, in the amount of \$10,000, and the amount recovered by the plaintiff is \$4,221.64, and the amount realized by the wool company used for buying \$2,000.00 worth of wool.

H. A. Harvey, of this city, wears the champion shirt badge of Utah county, awarded him at last week's meet at Ogden. It is to be for a month. While it will be exchanged for a new one, the shorts will denote the permanent name of the judge, the one being victorious to its owner. The badge is gold and is handsomely designed.

Suit has been filed by G. A. Stevens & Co., a corporation existing at Mantua, against Joseph Clegg, for \$10,000, balance due on cash loan, and \$10,000 interest on same. The complaint alleges that Clegg, a man of means, having about \$10,000 in cash, the amount to be repaid when \$12,814 pounds of wool, the property of defendant, should be sold by plaintiff. The wool was sold for cash \$12,740.00 received, which leaves in all ascertainable sum paid on cash loan.




