FORECAST TILL 6 P. M. SUNDAY. Local forecast for Salt Lake City and vicinity: Shows this afternoon and tonight, Sunday partly cloudy and warmer. Forecasts for Utah, taken at San Francisco: Shows this afternoon and tonight, Sunday, in northern portion cloudy; warmer Sunday in southern portion.

WEATHER CONDITIONS. The area of low pressure continues over the southwest. The crest of an area of unusually high pressure has made its appearance over British Columbia and promises clearing weather to this section tomorrow. Precipitation has fallen over southern Idaho, Utah, southern California, Montana, Wyoming, Colorado, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Texas, the Missouri and upper Mississippi valleys. Cedar City received .34 inch of precipitation during the past 24 hours, and is the coldest point on the map, its minimum temperature being 24 deg.
