COLONIA JUAREZ, MEXICO. CHANCE FOR HOMESEEKERS.

Exceptional Opportunities for the Industrious-The Poor Man's Country.

Colonia Juarez, Mexico, Feb. 23.-In a former letter, dated Batipito, Sonora, Feb. 4th, 1900, reference was made to the new colony just established at that place, and a few additional items may be of interest, historic and otherwise. Presidents A. W. Ivins and Helaman Pratt, with J. H. Martineau as engineer and surveyor, arrived on the ground of the future colony January 25th, and on the next day began the survey of several trial canal lines.
