The story of the bloodless battle of the grade is one which will be of inter-est to everyone who has followed the moves made in the southern part of the State, Adam Paul arrived on the ground with a party of men, acting un-der instructions from Mr. Whittemore on behalf of the Clark road, on Tues-day last. This was immediately after the decision had been rendered at Carson City. On Saturday he started with a gang of eight men and six teams to work on the grade according to the word received from Salt Lake to that

effect. This move was wired to Salt Lake by the agent at Uvada with the result that the Short Line rustled out a gang and steel and sent them to the scene, giving the train the right of way over the passenger train and every-thing else. This force arrived at 4 o'clock

k on Sunday morning and daylight they had commenced to lay the ties and rails. By noon Mr. Whittemore had arrived at by Uvada and acting under his instruc-tions, his men cut a trench across the tions, his men cut a trench across the grade at the Stateline and he forbade the Short Line to cross it. That night the gap was filled up and some 500 yards of track greeted Mr. Whittemore's gaze when he returned to the scene the next morning. Then a considerable amount of eloquence was in-dulged in, but the superior force of sixty men complaisantly continued to lay rails while the handful of Clark men discretely retired before the superior force to a spot some dozen miles down the grade where they are work-

down the grade where they are work-ing at the present time. Mr. Whitemore is slient as to what step he will take in the direction of heading off the invasion, now that he has returned to Salt Lake, but he inti-mates that when he does make another move that it will count. In the mean-time the Short Line is putting down ralls and has some 250 men at work on the job. the job.
