She was always happy and of a sunshiny disposition, during her six weeks of pain and suffering she never complained, but greeted everybody who visited her with a pleasant smile.

She was born at Riverside, Weber county, Oct. 15, 1885, and has lived in that ward all her life with her parents, the funeral services over her remains will be held at the Riverside meeting house Sunday afternoon at 10 o'clock. Her remains may be viewed at the family residence on date of funeral from 11 to 1:30 a.m. Interment will be in the city cemetery.
