### EASTERN.

**MEXICO.**—A messenger was dispatched from the city of Mexico, bearing Frank Moore, a well known citizen. At 3 o'clock his wife was awakened by a noise as if persons were struggling, and she called to her husband as if he were the intruder. He replied "Get up, I have popped a cap at me," and a moment afterwards he fell heavily on the floor. She then called her husband, who came in and found him lying insensible on the floor, with a wound on his head. He never spoke again, but lingered until five o'clock, when he expired. A window down stairs was raised and the body of the man was seen to have been thrown from the second story. The man was committed by a jury who had been discovered in the room by Moore, but will still hear his wife for a young man sleeping down stairs heard a report of the pistol.

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**NEW YORK.**—The Bank statement shows a net gain of \$349,455 in the legal reserve, which rises to \$1,142,520. BALTIMORE.—The insurance in the burnt district is estimated at \$300,000, and the entire loss is estimated to not exceed one million dollars. Marshal Grey, of the police department, during the height of the excitement, tried to blow up buildings to stop the progress of the flames, but he was satisfied that this would do no good. Help was tendered from Philadelphia, Harrisburg, and Alexandria, Va., and other points, which was promptly acknowledged by the authorities, with the request that it be held in reserve, until it could be used, if needed. An aid train from Washington with three flat cars, containing two engines, and two horse cars filled with firemen, made good time here in forty minutes, averaging a mile a minute. The two companies from Washington, with the two fire and three hook ladders, under the direction of this city, were all that were engaged in staying the conflagration.

MADRID.—The government troops attacked Valencia yesterday. After a desperate struggle of five hours, the town was surrendered, and the insurgents offered to capitulate, but their terms were refused. The government (depanded) sent reinforcements to Valencia. Heavy reinforcements have been sent forward and the attack will be resumed and the town will be besieged to-morrow if the insurgents do not yield. Seville has also proposed to surrender, but the national government, on certain terms, but as in the case of Valencia, the government will not accept anything less than unconditional surrender. It is believed that the insurgents will soon give up the city, unless relieved by French troops.
