

RACE OF FRESHMEN.

The Hottest Intercollegiate Contest Seen in this Country.

ALL PREVIOUS RECORDS BEATEN.

Yale Row Two Miles in 12:12 and the Other Crews Finish in Good Time.

POCONO, N. Y., June 23.—Three crews of freshmen on the Hudson this evening engaged in another annual regatta, and put up one of the hottest intercollegiate races ever witnessed in this country.

A crew of freshmen of Yale rowed the course in 12 minutes 12 seconds, a lighter crew of Harvard freshmen fought them every inch of the way and finished a trifle over two lengths behind them, and the Cornell freshmen, whose college record is that of the freshmen crews have never been beaten before, finished a length behind Harvard. The best previous record for two miles was 12:12, made by the Cornell freshmen crew of '94 at New London in 1901.

While the Cornell crew here are better for last time than upon the Thames, and while, therefore, some allowance should be made for the extra effort, the day's race was a very creditable one, all three of the crews having broken the record, the Yale crew in the first (Cornell) time of 11:55 seconds. At three of the events every pound of power in their muscles was put to some use, and each crew at some period of the race was in the lead.

The victory of Yale is looked upon by the rowing clubs as being in some measure indicative of the result of the regatta. It is not, however, the only one of the kind. In the same, for the Cornell freshmen crew has also along with the Yale crew, been fairly beaten and will be looked upon as a representative freshmen crew. On the contrary, the Yale crew of youngsters has been and will be more so, winning their yearly title. Mr. Cornell's freshmen crew have had quite a reputation put on them. The chances, however, are that the Cornell freshmen crew is likely to be Harvard, Yale, Cornell.

Harvard got the best clip on the water and in a few strokes drew to the front, closely followed by the Cornell crew, with Yale almost a quarter length in the rear.

Harvard and Cornell started at 35 strokes to the minute and Yale at 30 strokes at 25. At the half-mile mark, Yale leading the race, Harvard second, Cornell third, the Yale crew increased to 38 strokes and began to draw up, while Harvard and Cornell dropped down to 31 each. At the quarter mile Yale was still leading, but seemed to be tiring early, while Harvard and Cornell were working hard. Cornell drew up on the Harvard lead. Yale was tiring her stroke, and within the half mile had brought it down to 25 and was beginning to lag, and there was a perceptible lead to the boat that seemed to be in the others.

Just crossing the mile line, Yale had picked her boat up with that of Harvard and was showing the race front and a few inches. Cornell was laboring a length behind Harvard, rowing a rapid 38 strokes to the minute, and Yale's steady 25. From that point on to the finish Yale rowed steadily at 25 and 34, quickening to 36 several lengths from the finish, and endeavoring to make the Cornell rowers feel the pressure. Harvard, and Cornell a trifle worse.

When Yale passed both the Harvard and Cornell crews, just beyond the mile mark, Cornell, who had pulled their boat on to even terms, made a desperate effort to keep Yale from getting it, but it was of less avail than Harvard's, and at the mile and a half mark Yale was clear, while Cornell and Harvard. From there on to the finish Cornell whopped up to 36 per minute and closed the race slightly, but not just about an even length in Harvard's rear.
