A motion for a new trial has been filed in the district court by the defendants in the damage suit of C. A. Onasch against Salt Lake City and the Utah Light & Railway company. The motion is based upon a member of grounds among which are: excessive damages appearing to have been given under the influence of prejudice and passion; misconduct of the jury; that the verdict was obtained by resorting to chance and that each juror was in-duced to assent to said verdict by re-

A verdict was rendered in favor of plaintiff for \$12,500, and the affidavits of jurors Angus M. Lambert and Her-bert A. White, in support of the con-tention that the verdict was arrived at by chance, show that it was agreed be-tween the jurors that damages should be awarded to plaintiff against both defendants. Some of them suggested various sums ranging from \$10,000 to \$18,000. They finally agreed that they would add together all of said sums mentioned by each of the eight jurors and then divide the total by eight and that such quotient, after adding \$200 for medical attendance and deducting \$65, should be the verdict. The quo-tient was \$12,565. Deducting \$65 ac-cording to the agreement entered into between the jurors and the remainder would be \$12,500, which was the amount of the verdict returned.
