

## WESTERN NEWS ITEMS.

**Reported Rich Discovery of Gold Round About Mancos, Colo.**

**A BOY KILLS HIS STEP FATHER.**

The Creamery at Littleton, Colo., is being improved, so that among other things a new forty-horse power engine is being put in.

The Farish Reservoir & Canal company has been incorporated at Phoenix, Arizona, with a capital stock of \$100,000, to plan irrigation in that territory.

The state board of charities will say the Cheyenne (Wyo.) Leader, on the request of Warden Briggs, next week will visit and investigate the working of the state penitentiary.

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Wagons are still being used on the roads through the mountains between Brigham City and Waterville and Paradise. This is something unusual for this time of year, when those mountain roads are generally so packed full of snow that it is impossible to get through with loads, and teams are driven heavily. In the district court at Buena Vista, Col., on Saturday, Frank Graves, who killed his step-father because he intended his sister, received a sentence of three years in the penitentiary. 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A lady of this city, says the Brigham City Courier, has recently recovered from a frightful accident. She was standing near the hot cook stove, putting intensity over one of the latest fashion magazines and was aroused from her sleep by the strong odor of something burning. Looking down she found her apron had caught fire and she extinguished the flames. A large hole was burnt in her apron and her dress was burnt on the back.

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John Coffey, Jim Daly and Tim McCaffrey, who have been at work on the new Rock Hill for Creek & Murphy, railroad contractors, have been arrested at Denver, Colo., on charges of robbery. For crimes drawn on the First National Bank with the forged signatures of the firm employing them, accused were passed by them on Thursday afternoon. The men will stand trial next week and it is presumed they escaped the signature from them.

Work has commenced on a large-scale bridge crisis entitled for the County of Los Angeles, consisting of buildings at Los Angeles, Calif. When completed they will cover an acre of ground and will cost about \$100,000. The full capacity of the factory will be 100,000 and 150,000 per day, and when completed in full force will employ at least 1,000 men. It is estimated that the factory will be built on the hillside and will pay out annually for wages and products nearly a million and a half dollars annually.

Bear River is crossed over with a dangerous bridge of ice that ranges all the way from six to eight inches to thirteen. The ice crept up the river, and the current carried most of the great stream, completely covering the bridge. The ice was held by a dam of hundreds of tons of marsh banks, and extending several miles out into the deep waters of Great Salt Lake itself. The river was effectively frozen over, so that the people of Ogallala, and thousands of pounds of a good quality of ice have been taken and stored away for the coming 14 days of next summer.—*EZ.*

Coal gas from a stove has caused with a faint sound of cracking the death of an entire family at Aspen, Colo. Robert Wheeler on West Front Street, home as usual on Friday night and dead at an early hour. About 2 o'clock next morning a number of the house heard a faint call for help.
