COMMISSION ORDERS

Rome, July 18.—The spliabus pro-mulgated by the pope yesterday with regard to the so-called modernism in the faith, contains a preamble which sets forth that Roman Catholic authors, under the pretext of examining dog-mas, explain them in the name of his-tory in such a fashion that the dogmas themselves disappear. To prevent such efforts, the preamble says, the pope has ordered a congregation of the inquisition to note and reprove the principal er-port, and with his approbation 65 prop-oriettons are condemned. #### Favors Restoration of Canteen and More Pay for Petty Officers and Men.

Washington, July 18.—The convention of the army and navy union today voted in favor of the restoration of the army canteen and for an increase of 10 per cent in the pay of petty officers and en-listed men of the navy on every four years of service. The resolution in favor of the restora-tion of the army canteen declares: "That our own experience has shown beyond question that the sale of beer and light drinks in the army canteen was a veritable temperance measure; that it added in promoting the moral welfare and comfort of the men in the posts and oumps; and that no greater blow to gen-uine temperance was over struck than when the law was vepcaled."

#### PLATINUM PRICE ADVANCED.

New York, July 19.—Announcement is made that the price of platfnum has ad-vanced from 124 to 126.50 an ounce within a month and the dealers say that it will soon be 130 an ounce.
