AS TO AN ACCOMPLICE. Detective Franks Gives His Ideas as To the Methods Employed.

Detective E. A. Franks has been a firm believer in the idea that there were two persons involved in the murder of Hay. He has been quietly working on the case for a few days and from observations he has made has come to this conclusion, which was given to a "News" man today:

"Hay was undoubtedly enticed out of the Mortensen house by the man now under arrest and immediately upon his reaching the sidewalk an accomplice threw over Hay's head a cloth musile, with possibly a drug to produce unconsclousness, I do not believe that it was their first intention to kill their victim, but merely to secure the receipt and note and make it appear that Hay had received the money and had been robbed of it by persons other than the perpetrators of the crims: Upon reaching the place where Hay was killed it was either discovered that the victim was consclous and was in such a condition as to have been able to identify his captors, or the latter had supposed be was dead and agreed between themselves that the burial of the body was the safest course to pursue. It was then that the shot was fired to make sure the safest course to pursue. It was then that the shot was fired to make sure of their work and one man dug the grave while the other walked the track to keep a lookout. One thing which I have discovered gives me confidence in the statement made and that is that Miss Fisher, who lives a little northeast of the fatal spot, says that at 9:45 on Monday night she heard what appeared to be a man's stilled voice. She was ap much impressed with the noise that she was unable to sleep and of course since the tragedy became known she has been more worried than ever. It looks to me that it was impossible for one man to have committed the crime

#### Holding Back Eyldence.

The officers in charge of the murder The officers in charge of the murder case are now, devoting most of their time in arranging the evidence they have in hand rather than search for new clues and chase down idle rumors. Preparations are going on for a preliminary hearing and the accused will be arraigned as seen as it is thought advisable. The officials who have been working on the case admit without exworking on the case admit without exception their opinion that they have enough evidence to convict Mortensen of the murder of Hay. As stated in last evening's "News," much evidence is being withheld from the public in the interest of the prosecution and that evi-dence is the most damaging of all. The assertion that the police have directed their efforts entirely to fasten the crime on Mortensen is denied by them. They say they have expusted every means in their power to and some clue which would divert suspicion from the man, but everything points directly to him.

20,000 Letters and 30,000 Packages Handled Daily. mai no.

CALL FOR MONEY ORDERS.

Department Has to Send Several Tinses to Rank for Cash to Pay Demands.

The Salt Lake postoffice is one of the busiest, if not the busiest place in town today. People are fairly flooding the lobby of the targe office, and the wine dows of the stamp, money order and registry departments are packed with patient but cager individuals all the livelong day. The clerks are having a particularly hard time of it, as there to no appropriation providing for a extra rushes, and even Superintendent Flade has had to give up his desk for the time being, and roll up his sleeves and "jine hands" with the clerks in distributing the heavy-mails. It is figured that for the present the office is handling 20,000 letters per duy, and 30,500 packages. The clerks have to work 000 packages. The clerks have to work twelve hours and over per day while the rush is on, and for the next two days may have to work sixteen hours The registry department is head over

ears in business. Four clerks are do-ing their level best to keep their chins above water, but it is an Herculean task. The counters in the registry department are plied high with packages, and in the safe are seven large bags of Christmas packages received yesterday with more coming, and these bags can not be emptied and prepared for distri-bution until after Christmas is over. The mail is considered fifteen per cent heavier and more voluminous this season than last. Stamp purchasers are congratulating themselves that the man behind that window has a change making machine that gives the exact change in a second and makes no mis-takes. By its use business is greatly expedited. At the money order window cash is being paid out on orders at the rate of \$10,000 per day, with receipts hardly over \$1,500, so that it was necessary to send several times yesterday and today, to the bank for money with which to meet the demands. There is a steady stream of people in and out of the lobby all day, and there are the equally steady streams of missives of all shapes and sizes and destinations being dropped into the chutes whence they go flying to the basement, into great bankets on wheels prepared to receive them. As these baskets fill up every few momments, it requires con-stant watching that they may be removed and replaced with other recepta-cles, else shortly there is an overflow onto the floor. Everybody in the post-office will breathe a good long breath when Christmas is over, for the event work and deprivation for them.

Discovery of a Manuscript in an Old Clock Reveals It. 
