The Paving.

The work preparatory to paving Twenty-fifth street is progressing very favorably, but now the difficulty is in getting the dirt to Washington avenue, and the steam roller is setting the south of the street in proper shape for the pavements. In fact the laying of the pavement stones has been commenced, and the following day the Indians say the work passed to the Indians, unless something unforeseen turns up.

The S. P. Sheep.

Today Contractor Sheppard commenced laying brick on the Depton, Pacific side of the original line of streets, and the work is to proceed with all possible haste until the structure is completed. This is good news, for there are but few enterprises of a like nature that are not hampered by the want of money. The construction of the paving stones would be very costly, while well four pounds of clay may give one pound of shoddy ears. This would give a ration of 1.62, which would be about the amount of hay and grain that a full-grown sheep would consume in one day.

Sheep should have a ration of from 1.25 to 1.6, while it requires the abundance and the better grade of the caribou diet. The smaller the animal the more easily it can digest the rougher grasses. The larger the animal, the more difficult it is to digest them. This would give a ration of 1.62, which would be about the amount of hay and grain that a full-grown sheep would consume in one day.

A better ration than the above for one sheep two days or the two sheep one day would be eight pounds of clover hay, one pound of shoddy ears, one pound of oats, and one pound of rye. A well-clipped sheep for three days' work or four sheep three days would be twelve pounds of clover hay, one pound of shoddy ears, one pound of oats and one pound of rye, which would give a ration of 1.62. Another ration for four sheep one day or one sheep four days would be sixteen pounds of clover hay, one pound of oats, one of rye and one of rye, which would give a ration of 1.62.

From this the reader who has sheep has no cause to complain a ration that will be very nearly balanced from the material he has on hand. It would be stated in advance that sheep like variety of food, but it should be of a variety to which they are accustomed, and hence every great care should be used in feeding them. It is also important not to get the sheep off their feed, which can be very easily done by giving them too much water, and in fact, if a sheep has been given two or three days should be turned to eat the grass on full feed. It is best to feed three times per day and to keep eyes to the weather.

In case of wet and soggy weather sheep often consume less than in cold, clear weather, and the result will be that something will be lost in the troughs. This should be cleaned out at once and no more feed given than they will eat up without waste. If a sheep has been given too much water it will go to feed sheep off the grass and will eat more than six weeks—John Homestead.

Court News.

The suit of N. T. Moore vs Jane H. Chapman and Frank Whitehead was concluded at 10:30 A.M. yesterday in favor of the plaintiff. The amount claimed was \$100. Plaintiff's attorney, Mr. Evans, declared that he could not expect justice in a Justice's court in this case.

Jesse Browning and John Tremaine were before Justice of the Peace Commissioner Glidson on the charge of robbing the Lyman Mercantile company at Five Points. Browning was held to the grand jury, while Tremaine will be returned to the baronial.

Justice Cahoon will have before him today Lester Lord, a youth of eighteen, arrested on Sunday by Officer Coker on the charge of robbing and "fowling the pigeons." He had been shot in the shoulder from his pistol and was endeavoring to become a public charge at the hospital.

Barney McRae, a transient, was rearrested in yesterday's edition of the Standard, Justice Commissioner Glidson on the charge of robbing a telegraph office at 9:30 A.M. and a ticket to Pasadena, California. He will have a chance to explain to the court.

Attorney W. E. White, who on several months ago, got a fine sum from the penitentiary on the 12th of August, having served out his term of eighteen months, less the time gained under the corporal.

FATTENING SHEEP.

Ration White Hill Wool Propane Thinn
for Market.

The tools available for feeding sheep on the western range are easily over and over folder, carts and horse bags with the addition in some sections of bags, in others, others bags and carts, and in still others sledges. The temperature of flocks will be fed closely together so as to give them all they will eat, allowing something to remain over in the troughs as they do with bags and carts, but in this way will make a serious mistake. They will also be compelled to feed for long periods, and in this they will make many mistakes. Care is to feed lightly and frequently and hence the flocks will be fed more rapidly and with less loss of character, and while this is the most available food it requires much care and skill in handling coarse feed, and for this there is nothing better than sheep bags.
