

Cavallo were sold at Austin on the 10th of Feb.

A special to the *Herald*, Washington, 3d, says a note from the army of the Potomac, dated 9-30 this morning, says messengers from Kilpatrick, whom they left 10 miles south of Hanover junction on Wednesday morning, report that the command had most thoroughly and effectually destroyed the Virginia Central railroad from Beaver Dam to Hanover junction and the Richmond and Fredericksburg railroad from Mattaponi bridge to Pamunky river; the entire distance destroyed is over 40 miles. There was some skirmishing during the advance, but it was confined mostly to the right flank of Kilpatrick's command.

New York, 4.

The *World's Key West* letter says there are reports that Farragut has opened fire on Fort Morgan, and also gives a rumor that Beauregard is now in command at Mobile. The obstructions in the harbor are similar in character to those at Charleston. It was believed that Fort Morgan will be ultimately destroyed or captured.

The committee on the conduct of the war have been for several days past investigating the conduct of Gen. Meade at the battle of Gettysburg. Gen. Sickles and Doubleday testified that Gen. Meade wrote an order to fall back 17 miles, and, but for the rebels attacking sooner than expected, the retreat would have been ordered.

Chicago, 5.

A fire in Erie, Pennsylvania, yesterday, destroyed the Reed House and some adjoining buildings; loss about \$200,000.

A special to the *Tribune*, Washington 4 says a despatch from Memphis, 1st, was received this evening. It gives some new and interesting details of Sherman's movements. The despatch says that after having reached Meridian, Sherman sent out scouts to feel the ground and ascertain whether Logan, who had started from Florence to meet him, and Smith and Grierson, on whose cavalry he relied to prosecute his march on Selma, were advancing. Three days elapsed before he received any answer, but as the army had but limited rations he, by a rapid movement which disconcerted the rebels, suddenly turned toward Aberdeen and Columbus, in the richest parts of Eastern Mississippi, where his army was sure to find abundance of provisions.

By this movement he turned his back on Selma and Mobile, and marched toward Logan who had already advanced to meet him, and by an audacious stroke of strategy placed himself at a distance of about 100 miles from Johnston's flank now menaced by his advance. The despatch says the rumor concerning an attack upon Mobile and Selma by Sherman was simply meant to divert public attention from the real object of the expedition, which aims at the invasion of Georgia somewhere between Trenton and Lafayette.

Washington, 5.

The *Republican*, last evening, says it is authorized to announce that government has received a dispatch from Gen. Butler announcing that Kilpatrick succeeded in cutting the railroad and telegraph communications of Gen. Lee with Richmond, by tearing up the rails on the Central railroad at various points and destroying the canal and mills on James river; he burned much other property belonging to the rebels, inflicting a severe blow on the rebellion; he was met by the enemy outside the defenses of Richmond, but succeeded in forcing him inside the outer works, where a spirited engagement ensued, when darkness came on and the conflict ended. Kilpatrick, finding the enemy and works too strong to allow him to reach the city and accomplish the object of the expedition, withdrew and reached the lines of Gen. Butler, with a loss of about 150 men.

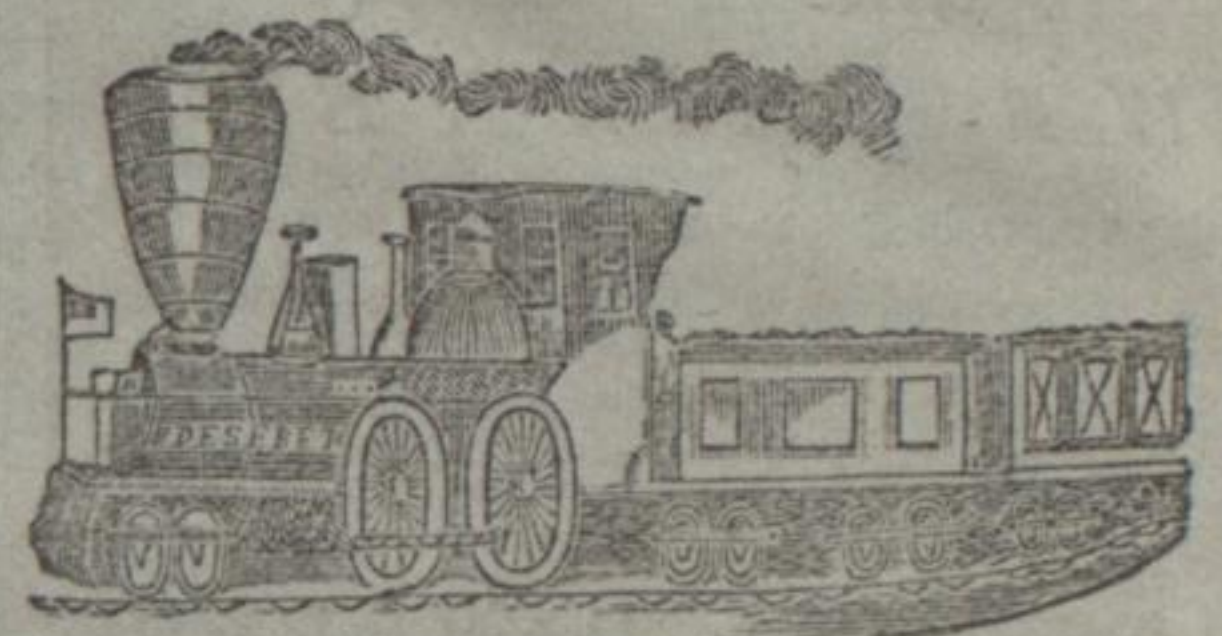
