Eighteenth.—To encourage planting and raising Forest, Fruit and Shade Trees, Shrubbery, Flowers and Bulbs suitable to our climate, and thus prevent thousands of dollars being annually sent out of the Territory.

Nineteenth.—To encourage the breeding and raising of fine Stock, and discourage the people from sending their means out of the Territory for such stock when it can be obtained here at as reasonable rates.

By counseling together we hope to be able to see the way clearer for establishing some of the industries referred to; of devising methods for assisting those already started, and utilizing for the benefit of all, some, at least of the many natural resources of our rich and growing Territory.

SILVER REEF, April 15, 1881.

Editor Deseret News:

Captain H. S. Lubbock, who has been here from the start, has resigned as superintendent of the Christy Company's property, and the vice-president has taken, I am told, temporary charge. Mr. Lubbock is a gentleman whom all classes will miss. He came here to attend to his business and not to make a fuss with "Mormons," and has been a fair dealing and honorable man, and has made many friends among the old settlers of this county.

Mr. R. L. Ogden has also resigned as superintendent of the Barbee & Walker property, and Richard T. Gillespie, a man well and favorably known in this community, has been appointed his successor.

Supt. W. O. Allen, of the Stormont, is back since the trial of the Union men at Beaver, and has commenced pumping out the water from their Savage shaft, and matters look rather more settled, and when labor can be got as at other mining camps in Utah, all four of the mills will run, which will make our business men look a little more cheerful, and will put more money in circulation, as people as far north as Juab and Sanpete Counties bring supplies of grain, flour, butter, eggs, etc., to this market. And these mills pay out, when running all their mines for labor, fuel, lumber, timbers, merchandise, etc., not far from \$50,000 per month, three-fourths of which has been stopped since the strike.

Matters for our agriculturists look splendid in Dixie, as we have had a good many warm rains during the winter and spring, and the hills are covered with feed and flowers, and now is the best time for a favorable outlook to some of us "Dear Dixie Land."

Your correspondent has been a resident of Washington County 20 years when next December arrives, and thinks this a good home for the Saints.

Prest. E. R. Snow is expected home in a few days after nearly six months absence. He is always welcome as we view him as a sound, father and friend to the people of the South, with whom he has labored for nearly 20 years, and we regret his valuable services being needed so much in other parts, but as a sound, good man among our new

A Marvelous Feat.

The publication of the details of the battle at Spitzkop between the Boers and English was one of the most marvelous feats of newspaper and telegraph enterprise ever known. The London Standard sent Mr. Cameron, the hardy, resolute, fearless African explorer, with the British advance to report its operations. He accompanied it in its difficult march to the summit of the fatal height. When the Boers made that gallant charge in the face of the English bayonets, about which they brag so much, and poured over into the basin from which they drove the English like sheep, Mr. Cameron was knocked down, run over, trampled upon and captured. He showed his newspaper credentials and note-book, and having established his professional identity, was requested to act as a flag of truce bearer to enable the English to take care of their wounded. He reached the British camp that night and wrote his dispatch of 2,500 words. That dispatch was put upon the army field wires and reached the coast. Hence it traveled up the east coast of Africa, over 3,000 miles, and tapped the East Indian wires in the Gulf of Aden; thence on the bottom of the Red Sea, another 2,000 or 3,000 miles, to the Mediterranean; thence on the bottom of the Mediterranean to Italy; thence through Italy and over the Alps and through France and across the British Channel to London. Not stopping there, it goes to Valencia, on the west coast of Ireland, and speeds across the Atlantic to Newfoundland, thence to New York, across the continent to San Francisco, and on the following morning it is printed in every daily newspaper in the civilized world—a thousand of them in this country.—*Chicago Tribune.*
