

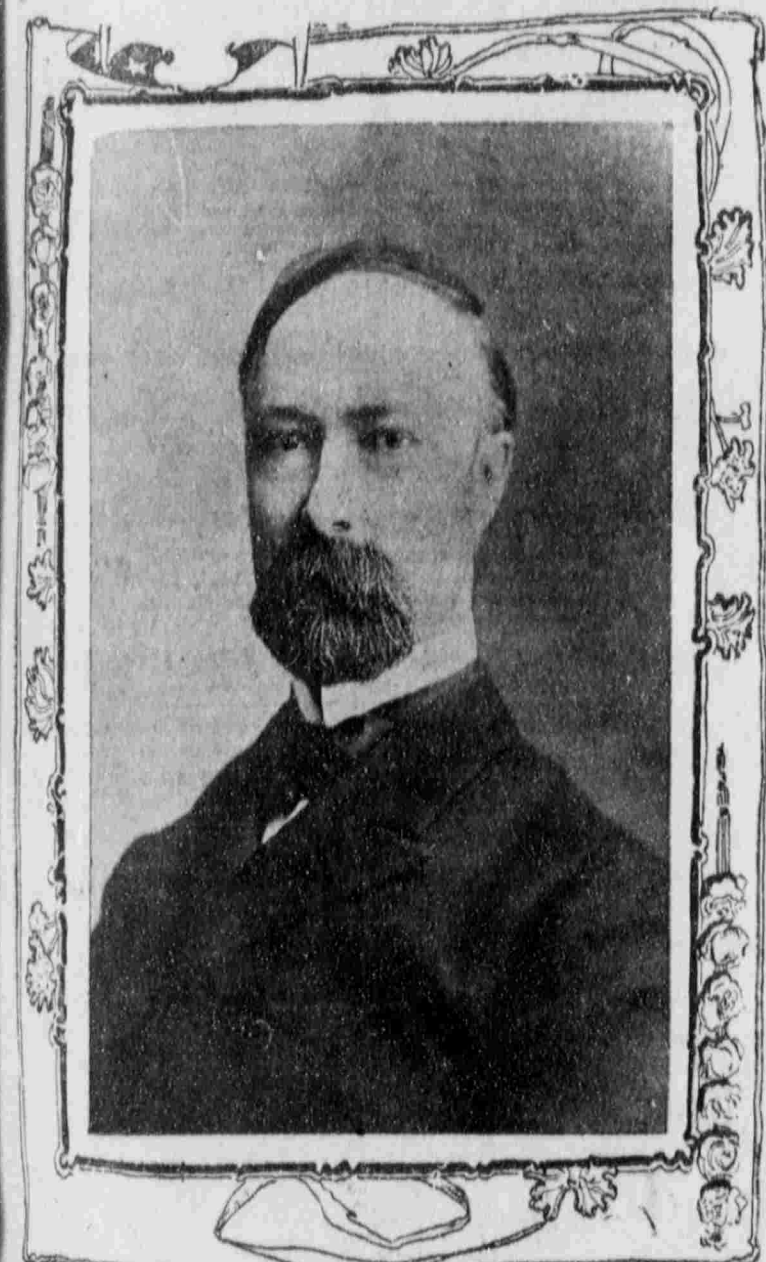
FAIRBANKS GIVEN A ROYAL WELCOME

Republican Vice Presidential Candidate Addresses Large Audience in Ogden

DISCUSSES OUR FOREIGN TRADE.

Makes no Reference to Local Conditions Though Well Satisfied With Information.

Ogden, Utah, Oct. 6.—Senator Fairbanks arrived in Ogden at 4 o'clock today, and spoke to an audience which filled the capacity of that hall to the utmost. He did not discuss the political situation as it pertains to this city, but did not fail to do so for lack of information.

When the Fairbanks train made its first stop of the day at Elko, Nev., about 300 miles west of this city, the vice presidential candidate was met by Senator Smoot and 17 other leading members of the regular Republican organization, who accompanied the travelers to Ogden. The Utah delegation included in addition to Senator Smoot, Congressman Howells, ex-Gov. Thomas, two members of the state supreme court and other representative citizens, one-half being "Mormons," and the other half Gentiles. Several of them conferred during the day with Senator Fairbanks, and when he arrived here he found awaiting him Senator Kearns, who heads the American party. He was soon closeted with the Indiana senator. No statement was made concerning the various interviews, but Senator Fairbanks early decided to make no reference to the state complication in his public utterances.

NO SPEECHES BETWEEN.

No speeches were made between Elko and Ogden, and the most interesting event of the day aside from the private discussions of the Utah situation was the travel across Great Salt Lake route via the Lach cut-off on the Southern Pacific. Senator Fairbanks and his traveling companions found much in that engineering feat to admire. When this point was reached the party left the Southern Pacific, over which it had traveled for 1700 miles, intending to proceed eastward tomorrow over the Union Pacific.

DOLLIVER WITH PARTY.

Senator Fairbanks was rejoined here by Senator Dolliver, who had remained behind in Portland because of a slight throat affection and in order to prepare for a campaign in Colorado, for which he had been engaged. The Iowa senator spoke at the meeting tonight. He will remain with Senator Fairbanks until Cheyenne is reached, and will then probably proceed to Colorado. Congressman W. J. Smith of Iowa also joined Senator Fairbanks here with the expectation of conferring with him until after the senator concludes his Iowa campaign next week. Senator Fulton returned tonight to Oregon.

OUR FOREIGN TRADE.

Senator Fairbanks devoted a portion of his address tonight to the extension of our foreign trade, saying on that point:

"We are fortunate in the prevalence of prosperity at home and in the maintenance of peace and good order in all sections of the republic. Our countrymen are busily engaged in increasing our commercial strength and in building homes throughout the republic. The erection of homes is one of the evidences of wealth and good order. There have been more homes erected during the last seven and a half years than in the period of the history of the republic. In the final analysis, the home is the unit of the strength of the republic."

events of the past few years has come to take a leading part in international affairs. We have avoided all international alliances which might involve either the safety or the honor of the nation. The United States never occupied a higher place in the esteem of the world than it does today. Our diplomacy is predicated upon the principles of international justice. We are desirous of increasing our commercial influence abroad, of enlarging our foreign market in the interest of American capital and labor. It is in the utmost degree necessary that we should be recognized as a nation which scrupulously observes the rights of other nations; which seeks to expand its influence, not by the power of might, but by the irresistible force of right. The victories of right are those alone which endure. A continuation of the present administration means a continuation of relations of amity with all powers, great and small alike.

WHAT VICTORY MEANS.

"It means an expansion of our trade with foreign countries. It means an increase of our prestige among the sisterhood of nations. The delicate relations between other powers in the orient, and the importance of preserving there the open door to our commerce, make it of the utmost importance that we should continue unbroken our present foreign policy. This is not a matter of sentiment, but it is essentially a material question. It is predicated upon the highest considerations of commercial and national interest."

The meeting was presided over by Attorney J. D. Murphy, and much enthusiasm was manifested, the speeches being frequently applauded.

RUSSIANS MAY EVACUATE MUKDEN.

London, Oct. 7.—The significance of a Mukden dispatch noting an unusual activity in that place is the subject of much speculation at St. Petersburg. The theory that indicates the purpose of Gen. Kuropatkin to evacuate the town is now generally accepted, military officers there surmising that the commotion noted is in connection with a movement to check a Japanese flanking operation.

In Russian official circles some credence is given to the rumor that Admiral Wiren has left Port Arthur with his ship, the confusion resulting from a severe storm on Tuesday being regarded as having made such a dash possible. Time expired members of the guards regiments in St. Petersburg and vicinity have been ordered to remain with the colors. There are indications that the Russian warships in the Baltic will soon be dispatched to the far east.

CHAMBERLAIN'S POLICY.

He Reopens His Fiscal Campaign At Luton, Bedfordshire.

London, Oct. 6.—Joseph Chamberlain reopened his fiscal campaign at Luton, Bedfordshire, tonight. He began his speech with an eloquent tribute to the late Sir William Vernon Harcourt, and said there was no member of parliament, regardless of party, but would sincerely and deeply regret the passing of that great political leader.

On the fiscal proposition Mr. Chamberlain said it was not a party question, but affected every vital interest of the country. He dwelt at considerable length on the agricultural situation and painted a gloomy picture of present conditions, predicted that there is worse to come and said agriculture had been crippled and land values shrunk by hundreds of millions.

The capital of farmers, he said, had fallen \$1,000,000,000. There are now fewer laborers by 1,000,000 than there was in 1881, and 13,000,000 people are underfed, while the people of America, Germany and other foreign countries are prosperous and surpassing Great Britain in every line of trade and business. He said that to deny existing conditions was impossible and to ignore them would be criminal.

Alluding to Mr. Balfour's Edinburgh speech, Mr. Chamberlain said he did not want the protection of 50 years ago, but he did want to make foreigners pay toll on shipments to the British market, and unless Great Britain and her colonies worked together there was nothing in sight but disintegration of the empire. Mr. Chamberlain said that Mr. Balfour's statement concerning a conference with the colonies marked a distinct advance, but Mr. Balfour should not delay, he should call the conference at once and see what terms could be made with the colonies.

Mr. Chamberlain saw only one blemish in Mr. Balfour's policy. That was the premier seemed to think it would be necessary after the conference had arrived at an agreement, to take a second election. Mr. Chamberlain saw no need of such a second plebiscite and foresaw useless and endless delay. Before the agreement was submitted to the respective parliaments they had to wait until every legislator at home and in the colonies was re-elected.
