PLEASANT GROVE. DEATH OF BISHOP SWENSON.

Seventy-five Years of Usefulness

Peacefully Ended. Special Correspondence. Pleasant Grove, Utah Co., March 14.--Bishop Canute Swenson, a long and tried veteran in the Church, passed reasefully away this morning at the age of 75 years. He was born in Weiby, Unrefine Down If jorring, Denmark, April 11, 1827. In Jis boyhood and early manhood he vorked on his father's farm. In 1856 he embraced the gospel and was at once ordained to the priesthood. He presided over a branch and did some missionary work during the next two years. In 1858 he left his home for Zion starting from his native town on loot and crossing the plains with an ox team. On reaching Utah he settled in Pleasant Grove where he has since resided. In 1877 he was chosen second counselor to Bishop John Brown and zerved in that office till 1890 when he was called to act as Bishop over the Pleasant Grove Third ward. In this capacity he served nine years when he

gate, Middlesex, England, Oct. 15, 1819, In his early youth he listened to the preaching of Elder Orson Hyde and others, and became convinced of the truthfulness of the Gospel, and was baptized in 1841. In 1842 he was ordained a Seventy, and in 1843 he went to England on his first mission. He was the first to inaugurate the tract sys-tem by publishing the "Fireside Visi-tor." Returning to the United States, he was again sent. in 1861, on a mission to the Eastern States and Nova Scotia, returning home the next year. Other missions were performed by him, in various parts of the country, which showed his early zeal and faithfulness in the work of God. During his sojourn in Nauvoo, he taught school, and acted in the capacity of clerk for lead-ing members of the Church, and at one time was private secretary to the late President Young. At the solicitation of President Young he performed meritor-
