THE CHINOOK IN CAPTIVITY

Fish With Suicidal Mania Will be Shown at Lewis & Clark Exposition.

Portland-The Chinook salmon, king of fresh water fishes, will be shown in captivity for the first time at the Lewis and Clark exposition. Previous Lewis and Clark exposition. Previous efforts to exhibit the fish alive have failed on account of the suicidal pro-pensities of the captive. When placed in a tank, the chinook immediately kills himself by butting his head against the wall of his cell. A. H. Baldwin, who is in charge of the fisheries bureau exhibit at the western world's fair, has had two im-mense tanks. larger than any ever

mense tanks, larger than any ever before used for exhibition purposes, constructed for the salmon. It is be-lieved that the fish, when given the lieved that the fish, when given the liberty of so large a prison, will be satisfied with life and subnit to a comfortable, if monotonous, existence within the glass walls of his jail. The chinook is the largest and most valuable of the salmon species, and averages 20 pounds in weight. Chinooks weighing from 30 to 40 pounds are not uncommon however and a few attain

uncommon, however, and a few attain to a weight of 85 or 90 pounds, and a length of five and a half to six feet One of these monsters will be secured for exhibition in the big tank in the government fisheries building.
