

YAGUI INDIANS  
WIN A BATTLEDisperse 300 Mexicans, Capture a  
Town and Besiege Another.

## THEY CART OFF THE MAILS

Story of Hanging Goes on—Expedi-  
tion to the Belaguered Town—  
Heavy Fighting Expected.

[Early Dispatches.]

Chicago, March 6.—A special to the Tribune from Potam, Mexico, says: Three days ago the Yaquis intercepted the mail, which was being conveyed under an escort of 300 soldiers. Of the 30 soldiers all were dispersed except two, who were hanged to near by trees. The Yaquis carried off the mails.

Yesterday the Yaquis laid siege to Cocorit and captured Tegota, a mile below. They will attempt to burn Cocorit if it holds out beyond tomorrow. There are 300 Yaquis between Potam and Torin. Twenty-four Mexican soldiers have been brought into the military hospital and on the field.

Mail communication between Potam and Guaymas has been stopped. Today twenty-seven Yaquis fired into a body of 200 Mexican soldiers on the road between Potam and Torin and dispersed them.

Between Potam and Torin, fifteen miles distant, sixteen bodies are hanging to trees, fourteen being Yaquis and two Mexicans.

An expedition of 400 men has left Cocorit to open the road to Cocorit, and great fighting is expected.

## ANOTHER TRAIN DISASTER.

Several Men Fatally Injured—Forty-two Hurt.

Brazil, Ind., March 5.—A miner train carrying 400 workmen employed at the mines north of here to their homes in this city was run into by a local freight train on the C. & I. railroad at 5 o'clock this evening, and the caboose and two passenger coaches were shattered. Melvin Easter and Charles Cropley were instantly killed and more than forty persons were severely wounded, several of whom will die. Among the injured are:

Thomas Harroway, both legs broken.  
John Erickson, back broken.  
Thomas Davis, both arms broken.  
John Little, arm broken.

The wreck occurred in a deep cut in the center of a short curve. The railroad company sent a special train and brought the wounded to this city. All the vehicles obtainable at the livery stable and carriages from private homes. Hundreds of women gathered at the depot and grasped their maimed and bleeding husbands and brothers in their arms when they were carried from the train.

## To Reduce Cost of Paper.

Washington, March 5.—Representatives of California today introduced a joint resolution for the repeal of duties on white or printing paper, at the material from which it is made at directing the attorney general to proceed under the anti-trust law to suppress the monopoly.

The resolution maintains a monopoly in such paper and material. The resolution recites that the existing duty of 10 per cent greatly aids in the maintenance of the monopoly; that the price of paper has been increased 60 per cent since the enactment of the tariff act of 1890, and that this result is a menace to popular education and the dissemination of information.

## Bailey of Texas Got His Way.

Washington, March 5.—Considerable miscellaneous business, much of a miscellaneous character, was transacted in the House today. During the consideration of a bill to incorporate the Frederick Douglass Memorial and Historical Association, the Speaker and Mr. Bailey of Texas introduced a bill to amend the act of March 3, 1879, relating to the sale of the late Frederick Douglass's library, and that this result is a menace to popular education and the dissemination of information.

This bill proposes to collect at the residence of the late Frederick Douglass in this city a record of the anti-slavery movement.

## Carter is for Quay.

Washington, March 5.—Senator Carter dealt vigorously with the Quay case in the Senate today in the course of an explanation as to why he will vote for the former senator from Pennsylvania, notwithstanding that he voted against the seating of Mr. Corbett in the last Congress.

## THE BIG WHISKY CLUB.

Members Stand By Each Other in Preference to All Else.

New York, March 6.—The Knights of the Royal Arch, a semi-secret protective and benevolent order, membership in which is confined exclusively to persons engaged in the liquor traffic, has been in existence for some time past, having been organized in Hot Springs, Arkansas, but is held up to the present time has been confined to States in the South and Southwest.

Two prominent members of the order have been in New York for several days for the purpose of ascertaining the sentiment of persons engaged in the liquor business toward the establishment of the order in this city. They have called a meeting of liquor men to be held in this city today, when the purposes of the order will be explained, and steps will be taken to organize a lodge. The order has a total membership in the United States of 80,000.

No denial is made by those interested in the order that one of its chief objects is to influence legislation in favor of those engaged in the liquor traffic. The constitution provides that membership is open not only to brewers, wholesale liquor dealers, saloon keepers and barkeepers, but even to men whose duty it is to sweep out saloons each day, and drivers of brewery wagons. Members are under obligation to stand by each other in matters affecting their mutual interests. Candidates must be of good moral character, believe in a Divine being, and must not be "habitual drunkards" or persons of doubtful reputation. The organizers make no denial of the fact that the temperance society will be fought by the order in every way.

How to Cure Baby Humors.

On January 17th last by Eugene Fishoff, an art dealer. It was valued at \$25,000, and was passed by the United States appraisers and duty was paid on the fixed valuation. It has since been ascertained that the painting was undervalued some \$20,000, having been sold at executors' sale of the estate of Sir Cecil Miles, Bart., in London, last May, for \$5,715, or about \$43,000. The seizure was ordered because of this alleged undervaluation. The case will be submitted to the United States general appraisers, and should they offer a fifty per cent increase on the original valuation the picture will under the law become an absolute forfeiture to the United States government. If the valuation is increased from 25 to 40 per cent a graduated duty will be imposed in addition to the additional duties.

According to the inspector, Mr. Fishoff claims to have disposed of the painting to the Fifth avenue dealer at private sale. The picture is the Virgin supporting the infant Jesus, standing on her lap. In size, it is five feet eight inches long and six feet seven inches wide.

## Morrell Island Disappears.

San Francisco, March 6.—Chief Officer Cooksey of the transport Grant said that on February 3 the ship sailed over the spot where Morrell Island has generally been supposed to be located. It is on all sailing charts, but at 11:30 a. m. on the date mentioned the Grant sailed over the position in lat. 29 degrees, 57 minutes north, longitude 174 degrees, 31 minutes east, and not a trace of the island could be found. At noon any land 40 feet above the level of the sea could be seen for a distance of 25 miles.

## Harrison to Puerto Rico.

Chicago, March 6.—A special to the Record from La Porte, Ind., says: Lieut. Colonel Russell B. Harrison, who has been located after electric railway interests in northern Indiana, will leave within ten days for Puerto Rico, where he will report to Gen. Davis, who was recently appointed inspector general on Gen. Davis' staff by President McKinley.

## Can Retaliate on Germany.

New York, March 6.—A special to the Herald from Washington says: Though the administration cannot protest against injurious legislation pending in the German legislature, it has developed that it has been making a quiet investigation to ascertain in the event of the adulteration of German importations into the United States.

This investigation has extended to the imports of other European goods, which impose restrictions upon American goods. In the case of Germany the information to be obtained from this government shall adopt should the most insidious bill, reported by the Reichstag committee, be enacted into law.

This investigation, which has been going on for some little time, has developed that the objection raised by the German government against American products also exists in German goods. This discovery is very gratifying to the officials, as it furnishes them with an excellent weapon to employ in case of need. German wines are said to contain adulterants, and the President, should he be determined to do so, can take means to exclude them.

## Laurier About Right.

Ottawa, Ont., March 6.—In the house of commons Mr. McNeill (imperialist, North Bruce), referring to the Montreal riots, said the British flag had been torn down and trampled under foot, and insinuated that President Kruger's action was making a bad matter worse. Premier Laurier repudiated the insinuation with warmth. If there were any money in it, said he, it came from parties very much closer to McNeill than was President Kruger. Mr. Tarte made a severe attack on the conservative leaders for raising the racial and creed cry, which, he said, had its culmination in the Montreal trouble. He made a strong British speech. Mr. Foster, for the conservatives, attacked Mr. Tarte.

POPULISTS  
WRITE TO KINGNotify Him That They Have Also  
Nominated Him for Congress.

## HOPE FOR HIS VICTORY.

Judge King Replies, Saying That He  
Will Further Explain His Position  
During the Campaign.

Henry W. Lawrence and L. E. Hall acting as a committee for and in behalf of the Populist party in Utah, sent the following letter to Hon. W. H. King, Dear Sir:—We have the honor to notify you that the People's party of Utah in State convention have nominated you as representative to the Fifty-sixth Congress to be voted for at the special election to be held April 2, 1900. While we do not agree with your political party in full, we believe it is in the interest of the public good to aid and maintain certain vital principles that are in harmony with our respective platforms.

The constitutional amendment to be voted on at the fall election giving the people direct legislation (through the initiative and referendum) as to the laws that shall govern them is the foundation principle of true Democracy. We are in accord with the principle of electing United States senators by the direct vote of the people. We favor the free and unlimited coinage of silver as full legal tender money. We are opposed to the present gold standard and currency legislation enacted by Congress and to the imperialistic tendencies of our government in acquiring Asiatic colonies by conquest, the increasing of the public debt and maintaining of a large standing army as a menace to the liberties of the American people.

## JUDGE KING'S ANSWER.

To the above Judge King last night responded:

"Gentlemen—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your communication of the 3rd inst., notifying me that the People's party in Utah in State convention have nominated me as representative to the Fifty-sixth Congress, to be voted for at the special election to be held on the 2nd prox.

In the same communication you set forth some of the political principles for which the People's party is contending. I note with pleasure that there are many points of agreement found in the principles embodied in the Democratic platform, and those advocated by the People's party, and because of such agreement I accept the nomination with which your party has honored me.

As you are aware, the Democratic party in this State, in its recent convention, re-affirmed the principles declared in the Chicago platform, and placed before the people as issues in this important election, questions that vitally affect the welfare of the people. In the same convention I was honored by being named for the nomination above referred to. My allegiance has always been given to the Democratic party, and I accepted without reservation the nomination tendered me by the representatives of that great party.

The Democratic party represents political principles which I most earnestly support; and while I do not fully agree with all the views advocated by the People's party, I cheerfully subscribe to those important and indeed paramount questions suggested in your communication. The Republican party, flushed with recent victories, is rioting in unconstitutional policies; it has been endeavoring to establish a new national platform, and overthrow the Monroe doctrine. It has made the Declaration of Independence meaningless, and fastened a vicious colonial policy upon the republic.

In present purpose, as evidenced by the conduct of the administration and the legislation in Congress, is to subject American citizens to a political degradation, and to make the republic a strong military power, and to convert the government of the people into one of greed and force and imperialism. Against the assaults of a party representing such a policy, it is an American duty that we should stand upon, which patriotic citizens can unite and battle for good government and the perpetuity of free institutions.

I will take the opportunity during the campaign, of explaining further my views upon the questions suggested in your communication.

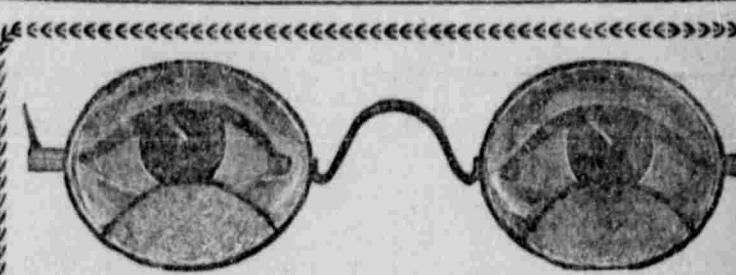
