cruisers and protected cruisers mem-bers of the committee were largely ined by the recommendation of Admiral Dewey, who declared armored cruisers superior to battleships in many respects, their inferiority in ar-mor and armament being more than compensated for, in his opinion, by their greater radius of action and their speed and manœuvering qualities. He said he would be willing to fight such an armored cruiser as he recommended against any battleship.

Admiral Dewey's experience with the Olympia and the other protected cruis-ers in bis squadron at the battle of Ma-nila led him to recommend the con-struction of similar vessels as the Olympia, but with larger displacement as to admit of their carrying heavier batteries and more protection for their

final decision has yet been No reached as to the armor for the new vessels and for those authorized in former bills, but it has practically been decided by the committee to provide that they shall have the very best armor obtainable and to increase the limit of cost to \$545 per ton. Last year's bill fixed the limit at \$400 and the secretary of the navy has been unable to contract for Krupp armor at that price. The increase limit will enable him to secure this armor.

As the bill stands it carries appropriations aggregating about \$63,000,000. This limit may be increased if the committee yields to pressure being ex-erted from citles in which navy yards are located to provide that some of the ships shall be built in government yards. If this is decided upon it will be necessary to very largely increase the appropriations for navy yards so as to provide for new shops and ma-chinery plants. It is not probable that

this will be done.

Canada Expects the Worst of It. New York, March 6 .- A special to the Evening Post from Boston says: Sir Chas, Tupper, ex-premier of Canada, who is making a brief visit in this city, was asked what the prospects were for a satisfactory settlement of the Alaskan boundary, and other dis-puted questions between Canada and the United States. He said:

"Great Britain and Canada have asked the United States government to consent to a settlement of the differences according to the Russian treaty of 1825, and we have asked your government to refer the whole matter to inter-national arbitration to decide where the boundary line was. Canada asks noth-ing. I suppose it will be settled on the same general lines as the Maine-Canada boundary line was adjusted and the same as that in British Columbia, when we got the worst of it, but it was the only way to solve the question."

Lowell, Mass., March 6 .- The Howe Lumber Company has assigned as a result of the failure of the Globe National bank in Boston, to which the company owed a large amount of money. The exact assets and liabilities are not yet known. The business was founded thirty-five years ago.
